MATMEN WIN IN SQUEAK

The Pelicans had a close squeak in notching their eighth straight wrestling victory of the season yesterday when they nipped Medford, 22-21.

The Pels won just one bout by fall, when Elvins Mitchell threw Medford's Norm Chapman in the 177-pound class.

But the Klamath team managed to score five by decision. George Olson won the nod over Bob Lyons in the 97-pound class; Dick Berg outpointed Roy Williams in the 160-pound division; Carl Stewart edged Lloyd Bendickson at 114 pounds; Ronnie Conner, 122, got the verdict over J. C. Rutherford; and Louie Taucher whipped Dave Newland in the 147-pound bracket.

Klamath's Don Dexter drew with Medford's Bob Reeves in the 129-pound division.

Medford won two bouts by the fall route—Jim McDaniels tossed Jay Dearing, 140; and Bud Thames pinned Jerry Williams, 167.

Three decisions went to the Black Tornado team: Larry Shepherd over Joe Quinowski, 135; Norm Hanscombe over Don Behn, 156; and Don Jacobs over Benny Lawver, heavyweight.

Rumor Edwards To Quit Vandy

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The Nashville Tennessean reports Bill Edwards is out as head football coach at Vanderbilt University and a successor will be named within a few days.

So far Edwards has declined comment.

Tennessean sports editor Raymond Johnson said in his column Edwards is stepping out for the same reason Rusty Russell quit at Southern Methodist University last Sunday—"high pressure of modern day football" and "the demand of the alumni for winning teams."

Edwards, who replaced Henry (Red) Sanders in 1949, was voted Southeastern Coach of the Week three times in 1951 and once last fall.

Sacred Heart-Chiloquin Tiff In Tonight's Hoop Spotlight

Loop Lead Hangs On Cage Mix

Jim Souza's Sacred Heart Trojans and Frank Duilio's Chiloquin Panthers square off tonight in a basketball fracas on the Academy floor that will give one of the teams an undisputed lead in the Klamath County cage family.

Junior varsities of both schools open the show in a 7:30 preliminary skirmish.

The Trojan-Panther mix is loaded with gate-appeal, particularly since Sacred Heart's 58-56 victory Jan. 20 at Chiloquin in a game that didn't count in the standings.

Tonight's game is a counter, the main event on a full county hoop program.

OTHER GAMES. Malin goes to Bly, Bonanza to Merrill, and Gilchrist to Henley.

Basketball fans are expected to jam the Academy court to watch the two teams with perfect league records, both with five victories.

Although a crucial meeting, actually about the only two things that ride on the outcome are the league's traveling trophy and top-seeding in the championship tournament Feb. 19-21.

The winner should earn both of these providing Sacred Heart gets by Bonanza next week and Chiloquin hurls Merrill. The blueprint says they will.

It's likely this will be the second of four meetings between the county's top-drawer teams. If put in opposite brackets in the tournament, they could meet again in the finals.

NEW PLAN. Then, with the new plan handed down by the district fathers, the two finalists in the tournament will meet again in the opening round of the single-elimination district tournament.

But, with upsets traditional in the county tournament, tonight's game could well be the last meeting between Sacred Heart and Chiloquin.

Tom Mulvey is Sacred Heart's scorer; the Panthers have Jo Jo George and Gene Gentry trading off scoring honors.

It shapes up as another thriller.

Middlecoff Quits Open

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — A full-blown rhabdomyolysis in which El Paso Open sponsors are bolting mad at golfer Cary Middlecoff for quitting in disgust over condition of their course almost overshadowed the fact Friday that Ted Kroil and Chandler Harper led the tournament into its second round.

Handsome, Cary, defending champion of the tournament, stalked off the windblown, dry-as-bone 6,300-yard El Paso Country Club course Thursday after shooting nine holes in five-over-par 41, and said it was the worst he ever had seen.

"I never before in my golf career took six bogeys in a row nor ever three-putted more than three greens in succession," he growled. "I three-putted five in a row here."

Bob Haynesworth, co-chairman of the Tournament Committee, called Middlecoff a poor sport and said the course was no worse than last year when Middlecoff won first money.

Meanwhile, Kroil and Harper, who seldom win first place but usually are active around the cash window, were shooting five-under-par 66's to tie for the first round lead. They were a stroke to the good over Doug Ford of Harrison, N. Y., who led until late in the day.

Olson Fights Hayes, Snubs Boxing Tourney

NEW YORK (AP)—The American middleweight tournament, already under withering counter fire from two sides, opens tonight with a 12-round match at Madison Square Garden between Rocky Castellani of Luzerne, Pa., and Pierre Langlois of France.

This elimination bout, scheduled for 10 p.m., EST, with ABC radio and NBC television coverage was to have been followed by a Saturday tournament battle at Boston. But that has been changed.

Carl (Bobo) Olson of Honolulu, who fights Norman Hayes of Boston in the 10-rounder, says he isn't interested in any tournament. His manager, Sid Flaherty, claims he has whipped "practically everybody in the tournament and can lick the rest."

J. Onslow Fane, British boxing chief, wants to kill the tournament.

Setons Keep Clean Slate

Honey Russell, coach of the undefeated Seton Hall basketball team, apparently is just as good a prophet as he is a coach.

Russell said two weeks ago the "toughest ones left on our schedule look like Villanova, St. Bonaventure, Siena and our western trip at the end with Loyola of Chicago, Dayton and Louisville."

Villanova became victim No. 21 last Saturday and St. Bonaventure became No. 22 Thursday night, 74-67. That leaves Seton Hall, the nation's top ranked team in the Associated Press poll, with eight games still to play in its bid for a perfect record.

The Seton-Hall-Bonnies struggle was part of a Madison Square Garden doubleheader which drew the largest Garden cage turnout of the season—15,482. Manhattan beat St. Johns of Brooklyn, 60-52, in the other game.

NCAA Names TV Committee

CHICAGO (AP) — Appointment of a 1953 Television Committee was the first order of business Friday at a meeting of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Council.

The NCAA annual convention last month voted 173-13 for a 1953 controlled football television policy. The specific plan will be set up by the TV Committee and submitted to NCAA members for approval in a mail vote.

The council also will make plans for a "conference of conferences" meeting Saturday and Sunday in Chicago.

A dozen conferences are expected to be represented.

"The meeting is to consider ways and means to strengthen conference enforcement machinery," said Walter Byers, NCAA executive director. "It also will provide for inter-conference investigating assistance and dovetail conference enforcement activities with those of the NCAA."
