TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—The Iranian government says paradise-seekers must get along from now without the jug of wine. And without opium too.
 A bill, unanimously approved yesterday by the Majlis (lower house of Parliament), demands that Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's government within six months ban the manufacture, import, sale or purchase and consumption of all alcoholic drinks, opium and opium derivatives. The cultivation of opium poppies must be discontinued within two years. Addicts will be given cures.

New Dimensional Films Latest Thing In H'Wood Battle Against TV Forces

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The movie industry is suffering the pangs of the second revolution in its 50 years of existence.
 Twenty-five years ago, the apathy of the movie-going public forced film makers to add sound to the silent screen.
 Today the gigantic rise of television in public favor has forced the same men to bring new dimensions to the movies.
 New - dimensional films have swept Hollywood like a prairie fire. Announcements of industry-shaking import are being made every day.
 Rash predictions are being made. Some foresee that the present flat screen will soon be as dead as top hats in Washington. Others say meekly that the 3-D novelty will wear off, and flat screens will prevail. Still others predict there will be room for both styles.
 There is a strong feeling that the new film methods should be standardized. This was first expressed by Columbia boss Harry Cohn. But the companies are already battling over which method will end on top.
 If the advent of sound was Movie War I, this is Movie War II.
 What are these new-dimensional methods? In brief and simple terms, there are two main divisions:
 1. Depth pictures.
 Scientists say there is only one way to achieve a sense of depth on a movie screen. That is by flashing two images on the screen and having you watch through special glasses.
 It is an optical trick. The two images of the same picture are filmed from slightly different angles. Each of your eyes sees only one picture because of the special glasses. You get a sensation of depth, the same as you did peering through the stereoscope in grandma's parlor.
 This is the method used in Natural Vision, Paramount's Natural Vision, and a new process announced yesterday by RKO. The RKO people say they have a license to use the only camera built especially for stereoscopic motion picture photography.
 It will add immeasurably to our morale," said Gen. Van Fleet.

Letter From A Friend To Men Overseas Drive Open

 NEW YORK (AP)—One day Mrs. George Blakeslee began to think of the bleak look she had seen on the faces of servicemen turning away from mail call empty-handed.
 Of the young corporal, home from Korea with a wounded leg, who said: "The most important things to the men overseas are food and mail."
 Of the letter from her soldier son, urging her to "do something about the apathy toward the men who are serving overseas."
 Mrs. Blakeslee, chic blonde wife of a New York neurologist, had been co-chairman of the Citizen's Committee for the Army and Navy in World War II. To her, to think of something needed by servicemen is to act. This time she reached for the telephone.
 A few weeks later, representatives of 19 leading American industries met at a luncheon called to launch a "Note From a Neighbor" campaign, approved by the Department of Defense.
 It is not a pen pal program—in which strangers write to strangers—but a campaign for new letters from friends, neighbors and business associates to men they know who are serving overseas.
 "The apathy toward the boys who are serving overseas has been terrible," said Mrs. Blakeslee. "I felt it would do them a great deal of good and make them know that what they are giving is deeply appreciated and that they are remembered warmly back home."
 "This flow of spontaneous friendliness from the folks back home

Youth Lives Through Burial

SEATTLE (AP)—A 17-year-old youth who spent eight hours buried in a Cascade Mountain avalanche, said yesterday, "I just kept praying and I guess it worked."
 Larry Schinke was one of three Seattle boys, all 17, caught in the tons of snow that tumbled down a steep gully Saturday as they were climbing toward a cabin on an overnight ski trip.
 One died. Schinke was rescued from what he was sure would be an icy grave, and the third fled from the avalanche's path and raced for help.
 The dead boy was Keith Jacobson, son of Berne Jacobson, city editor of the Post-Intelligencer.
 Word of the tragedy, in the Cascades 60 miles east of here, was brought out by Ed Almqvist, the third member of the youthful party.
 Schinke was dug out by rescuers late Saturday night, eight hours after he was entombed beneath four feet of snow. An arm thrown overhead created an air pocket, allowing him to breathe. He suffered only from shock and exposure.
