**CHICAGO LIVESTOCK** — Outside order buyers of hogs appeared disinclined Tuesday to follow the market higher. As a consequence, demand for lighter weights was poorest of the trade and the average was little better than steady with Monday. Sows were steady to strong.

Cattle were unevenly 50 cents lower to 25 cents higher with heavier weights of steer selling off and cows moving up.

Most barrows and gilts sold from \$18.50 to \$19.75. Sows ranged from \$15.75 to \$17.75 generally. Lighters brought \$21.50 to \$23.00 and choice heifers \$23.00 to \$26.00. Cows topped at \$16.00.

## Fire Loss Total Told

Fire loss within the Klamath Falls city limits during 1952 totaled \$35,972.65, according to the annual report of Fire Chief Roy Rowe, just filed at City Hall, in addition to the loss of one life and two injuries.

Sound value of property at risk by fire was \$3,587,882, and insurance collected on the loss came to \$50,223.65.

During the year the department answered 258 alarms, 22 of them false, and had equipment working for a total of 98 hours 31 minutes.

Matches and careless smokers were the chief cause of the year's blazes, Rowe reports, causing 91 of them, overhauled or defective stoves caused 36, hot coals or ashes 35 and electricity or defective wiring 27.

## Sump Area Leases Open

The Bureau of Reclamation is now inviting bids for the leasing of 15 lots of public land in the Southwest Sump area of the Tule Lake Lease Lands, according to an announcement today by E. L. Stephens, Project Manager of the Klamath Project. Leases are offered for the balance of calendar year 1953 only, with no option to renew.

Bids will be received at the Klamath Project office until 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, Feb. 24, 1953, at which time they will be publicly opened. Average size of the lots is 187 acres.

Bidders will be required to comply with the same conditions as those previous lessees in the Southwest Sump who have recently negotiated renewals of their leases. A sworn statement of operations, on a form furnished with the advertisement for bids, must be completed and attached to the bid proposal. Veterans preference will be recognized as in the past.

Row crops will be limited to 25 per cent of the area of each lot and cannot be planted on the same portions where row crops were grown last year. Some of the units offered for leasing are not suitable for growing of row crops.

Copies of the advertisement for bids will be at the Bureau of Reclamation offices in Klamath Falls and Medford.

Lots in the Frog Pond and League of Nations areas are not included in this invitation for bids. Another invitation will be issued later this month covering lots in those areas on which previous lessees do not elect to negotiate new leases under the revised terms now in effect.
