KF Employees Will Talk Retirement

City employees of Klamath Falls are to meet with the City Council Wednesday night to discuss and try to get some final action on a move to allow the workers to withdraw from the Oregon public employees retirement system.

The meeting is called for City Hall, 7:30 p.m.

A majority of the employees of the city are believed to be in favor of withdrawing from the state system to get under federal social security, because of the great cost and doubtful benefits of the state plan.

Employees of Klamath County already have petitioned for withdrawal from the retirement system and this month is expected to be the last they will have to pay into the state fund. Some county employees will get back substantial sums of money which they have put into the system in the past few years, and the county itself expects to get back a good

many thousands of dollars of its contributions.

The county adopted the state retirement system in 1946. On May 17 of that year there was a special city election on the question of whether Klamath Falls employees should be allowed to become a party to the state system and whether a tax levy of not to exceed one and one-half mills annually should be assessed to pay the city's

share of retirement fund contributions.

The proposal was defeated at the polls, 1,313 to 1,158.

However, in 1948 the city went into the retirement system anyway, taking on the cost as a city obligation without tax levy.
