WALL STREET
NEW YORK (AP)—Rising prices Wednesday in the stock market snapped a five-day string of declines.

The advance was not especially widespread nor was it too generous. Gains came between 1 and 2 points in the railroads section but they were largely fractional elsewhere in the list. Losses usually were small.

Business was restricted to an estimated 1,300,000 shares. That compares with 1,350,000 shares traded Tuesday. Both are well below average.

Potatoes

POTATO REPORT, Feb. 9
At Portland today the potato supply was fair. The demand was slow and the market dull.

At San Francisco the potato market was barely steady. Track sales of Klamath russets, U.S. No. 1, 4-ounce minimum size, brought 4.65 a 100 pound sack in brokers' sales.

At Los Angeles, the potato market was unsettled on long white potatoes. Russets held steady. Truck sales of Idaho russets, U.S. No. 1, A, brought 4.25 to 4.50 a 100 pound sack.

At Chicago the potato supply was moderate. The demand was fair and the market was unsettled. Truck sales of Idaho russets, U.S. No. 1, A, 25 to 35 per cent 10 ounces and larger, washed, ranged from \$5.10 to \$5.15 a 100 pound sack. Unwashed russets, brought \$5.05 a sack. Street sales of U.S. No. 1, A and generally good quality Idaho russets, ranged from \$3.25 to \$4.50 a 100 pound sack.

At Yakima on Friday, Feb. 6, there was practically no demand. The potato market was very dull. There were very few sales. Ellensburg russets, U.S. No. 2, washed, brought \$1.10 a 50 pound sack. P.O.B. the shipping point.

Total shipments of potatoes over the weekend amounted to approximately 1559 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped about 539 cars. Idaho moved around 489 cars, Oregon about 44 cars and Washington approximately 5 cars.

RC Asks Calls On Payroll Plan

Firms now using the payroll deduction plan for support of welfare and service agencies should immediately phone or call at Red Cross headquarters in the Army to clarify the problem of the various groups participating in the coming Red Cross membership drive. This drive is to get under way March 2.

The Red Cross is anxious to know how many persons are represented in the payroll deduction groups and to give the firms buttons and window stickers before the drive gets under way. This will prevent these contributors being solicited again.

The Red Cross will have a residential solicitation this year. Mrs. Virginia Dixon, executive director of the Klamath Chapter, said that solicitors would not call at homes displaying the window stickers.

Employees and management representatives of several of the payroll deduction firms attended a meeting last evening and received their Red Cross badge and stickers.

Mrs. Dixon said the Red Cross was using the residential campaign again this year because so many workers were not yet a member of a payroll deduction group.

Seed Spud Shipping Up

Seed potatoes from the Klamath Basin are being shipped this year in some of the largest quantities in history, and by the end of the season may well set a new seed shipment record.

As of the end of January 1932 carloads of seed potatoes alone had been shipped out. January accounted for 543 cars itself.

Last year in January 155 cars of seed spuds were shipped, and only 347 cars were shipped during the entire season.

Daily shipments have fallen off considerably here, with only 37 cars marked off yesterday. To date there have been some 8102 cars sent to market from this area as compared with 7180 for the same period a year ago.

Estimates are that from 10,000 to 11,000 cars of spuds were produced in this area the past season.
