Church Mural Draws Blast

MEXICO CITY — The Archbishop of Mexico today joined the chorus denouncing famed artist Diego Rivera's new movie house mural. Msgr. Luis Maria Martinez said the painting should be censured by all Mexican Catholics.

The controversial new painting, attacked as sacrilegious last week by the Mexican Nationalist party, depicts the famous Mexican film comic Marlon (Cantinflas) Moreno in his customary peasant film garb alongside the Virgin of Guadalupe, Catholic tradition says that the Virgin appeared in the 16th century to St. Juan Diego, an Indian peasant.

The archbishop said the painting "runs against the religious sentiments of all true Catholics." The PNM has threatened a boycott of the theater.

Morse Sees War Threat Over China

ROCHESTER, N. Y. — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, the Senate's only independent, says he believes the Chinese Nationalists may be trying to engage the United States in war on the China mainland in order to regain power.

Morse told a reporter Tuesday night:

"I want to make it clear that I have so little confidence in the fighting ability of the Nationalist Army that I am not in favor of endangering the lives of American boys in protecting it."

"It is my opinion that the Nationalist Chinese have for many months been trying to engage us in an expanded war against the Chinese Communists. We must be careful not to be drawn into all-out war."

Morse, who bolted the Republican Party during President Eisenhower's campaign last fall, said Eisenhower's State of the Union message dealing with plans for permitting Nationalist forces to re-enter the mainland left "holes which you could drive a truck through."

Morse added, "I would ask these questions:

"What are we to do after we withdraw the Seventh Fleet and Chinese Nationalist forces invade China, are beaten off and withdraw to Formosa with the Communists chasing them? Are we going to help throw the Reds back?"

The senator continued:

"Mr. Eisenhower has not been very clear to us as to what we will do after the Chinese become engaged in major combat. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I never heard a single briefing by the top officials of the Pentagon that ever caused me to believe that the Nationalist Chinese Army would ever be an effective fighting force on the mainland of China."

Morse was here for a speaking engagement.

Circus Man's Rites Held

CHICAGO (AP) — Circus music was played at funeral services Wednesday for Arthur Rankin (Hop) Hopper, widely known in the circus world for more than half a century. He wanted it that way.

Hopper had been a clown, bill poster, magician, advertising card manager, general agent and traffic manager for circuses all over the country, and a circus owner himself. He died on Feb. 2 in New York City at the age of 65.

Hopper had requested that he be buried in "Showmen's Rest," in Woodlawn Cemetery in suburban Forest Park. He also had asked that circus music be played at services. A special tape recording had been made by the Ringling Brothers & Barnum and Bailey circus band. Hopper had been retired as head of outdoor advertising and traffic for the circus, having been paralyzed for three years.

Friends, circus performers and showmen at the chapel heard the sprightly music of "The March of the Gladiators," "Barnum and Bailey's Favorite," "Circus Echoes," and "The Big Cage."

"The music for this service implies no disrespect for church music," F. Beverly Kelly, a theatrical agent, said in a brief eulogy.

SP Orders New Cars

Southern Pacific has placed orders for 25 new passenger chair cars, raising to 210 the number of streamlined cars the railroad has purchased for its passenger trains since end of World War II, it was announced today by D. J. Russell, president of the railroad.

The new purchases, Russell said, will bring Southern Pacific's expenditures for post-war passenger equipment to a total of approximately \$43,000,000.

Russell explained that about three-fourths of the railroad's passengers last year traveled in chair cars and coaches, indicating an increased demand for low-cost transportation. "Purchase of these new cars is in line with the company's policy of providing best possible accommodations for train services the public wants and will use," he said. The new cars will increase the railroad's passenger carrying capacity to meet civilian and military requirements.

Some of the new cars are designed for special comfort of overnight chair car travelers. These cars will have seats and leg rests especially designed for comfort when sleeping or reclining. Other cars will have 5-foot wide view windows, a distinctive feature of Southern Pacific trains operated in scenic areas. All of the new cars will have foam rubber seats adjustable to various reclining positions.
