KF Alsike Eligible On Support List

Well over 3,000,000 (M) pounds of Klamath Basin alsike clover seed has been made eligible for government support by local farmers, according to figures released from the local PMA office through County PMA Committee Chairman William Burnett.

In all, figures show eligible crops amount to some 3,388,384 (M) pounds of seed.

Price support is 25 cents per pound for seed which meets purity and germination requirements—98 per cent for purity and 90 per cent for germination. To be acceptable to the Commodity Credit Corporation, seed must be bagged in even-weight new bags of a kind and size approved by the CCC if and when the seed is delivered to the corporation.

Klamath County has 891,445 pounds of seed under loans and 778,300 under purchase agreements; Siskiyou County has 140,822 under loan, and 147,735 under purchase agreement; Modoc County has 234,863 pounds under loan, and 1,197,379 under purchase agreement.

The figures for each county were furnished by the respective PMA offices. They are not exact since there is some seed yet to be cleaned, but on which loans have been applied for not later than the deadline Jan. 31.

All seed under price support, according to Burnett, may be sold in commercial channels by the owner before April 30, 1953. If the seed is not disposed of by that time the government—or the CCC

is to purchase the seed at the support rate.

The opinion of local warehousemen is that about all the alsike seed remaining in the area is signed up for the price support program. An estimated 5,000,000 (M) pounds of seed was grown in this area, the small amount of which had been sold earlier at prices varying from 30 cents to less than 24 cents per pound.

There were a few reports of a little higher sales early in the season. The 1951 alsike crop, one of

the richest ever grown anywhere, saw some 8,000,000 (M) pounds of seed going at prices averaging an estimated 40 cents per pound.

However, an apparently flooded alsike market this year failed to put up a firm price on the seed except for a few fleeting moments way early in the season. When the price closed out, it did so quickly, with little chance for "putting the foot in the door" for most farmers.

The greatest number of sales of the season were for prices ranging around the support price mark.

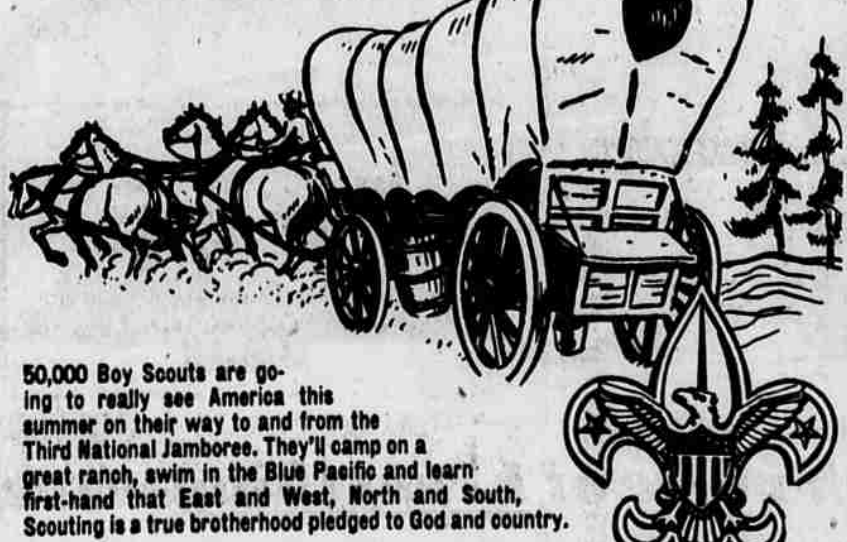
