New Church Monument to Strong Faith of Pioneer Klamath Group

There are larger churches in the Klamath Country than the new Mt. Laki Community Presbyterian but none finer; and certainly no church is more steeped in Christian endeavor.

The conclave of a small group of Christians Nov. 1, 1908, has culminated in a staunchly built and beautifully fitted edifice, a building of such sturdy construction that it should one day be a Southern Oregon landmark of Faith.

That 1908 meeting which marked the beginning of the church was conducted in Spring Lake School. Presbytery had charged two ministers, the Rev. George T. Pratt, Klamath Falls First Presbyterian, and the Rev. Louis M. Anderson, Merrill Presbyterian, to organize the new church.

CHARTER MEMBERS

There were only 11 charter members. They were J. G. Stevenson, Mrs. Stevenson, A. D. Addison, Mrs. Addison, Mrs. A. L. LaPrarie, Rex LaPrarie, Roy LaPrarie, Geo. D. Grizzle, Mrs. Grizzle, Mrs. Sarah Steeman and Florence M. Short. J. G. Stevenson was installed as elder and the Rev. Anderson, moderator. Stevenson was also named clerk.

John Koontz deeded the new church an acre of ground on the southwest corner of his homestead and Elder Stevenson began organizing the drive to build. It was principally through the elder's zealous and untiring work that a small and picturesque frame structure was realized a few years later.

The church was incorporated March 11, 1909, in a meeting at the LaPrarie home, with John Koontz, Charles Steeman and J. G. Stevenson named trustees.

The church had steadily gained new members and one of the most valued of these was Mrs. John Koontz, who for several years taught in the Sunday School, headed the Ladies Aid and took an active role in many other activities.

FIRST PASTOR

It was not until March, 1912, that the church was able to call its first pastor, the Rev. Anderson of Merrill. Under his leadership the church accelerated its growth and began to take its place as a full working member in the Klamath Country's family of churches.

There were intervals during the next several years when the church had no regular pastor but faith was kept strong as many outside pastors and laymen volunteered for pulpit duty.

In January of 1949, the Rev. J. R. DeLap accepted a call as full pastor and that same year the congregation, aided by generous persons outside the membership, succeeded in building an attractive patronage.

The Rev. DeLap stayed only until August of 1950, when he accepted a call to Redding, but during that comparatively short span there was a heartening growth in both membership and spirit at Mt. Laki.

In the fall of 1950, the church was fortunate in having the Rev. Arthur Rice accept the pulpit. This veteran pastor had been an early minister of the Klamath Falls First Presbyterian Church and was well known to most of the Mt. Laki congregation. He has recently announced he was retiring on orders of his physician.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Semon and their daughter, Gretchen, appeared at the meeting and Semon proposed that his family finance the chapel of the proposed new structure leaving the rest of the membership the task of financing Sunday School

rooms and other auxiliary units. The Semons dedicated their gift to the memory of their son Charles and other young men close to the church who had lost their lives in World War II. The names of Charles and these following heroes are to appear on a plaque in the chapel: Rollo Cheyne, Robert Bunnell, James McKeehan, Robert Cameron, Lloyd Barnes and Robert Hamilton.

Cornerstone of the new church was laid in July of last year and the completed church was dedicated in December.

The beautifully finished chapel of the church is one of the most attractive such auditoriums in the West.
