Defense Fund Bid Refused

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Defense Department request for \$1,200,000 in new funds for the current year was rejected in full by the House Appropriations Committee Monday.

The committee said the Department should use available funds to finance the programs for which the new money had been requested.

Most of the new money sought was for Army, Navy and Air Force military pay, increases in which were voted by Congress since the last Defense Department budget was approved.

The request for additional funds came from former President Truman before he left office last month. In some cases, President Eisenhower revised the requests, but in others he made no changes.

The defense fund requests were considered along with recommendations for additional money for numerous other agencies. The committee action cleared for floor debate Tuesday the first appropriation bill of the 83rd Congress.

In all, Congress was asked to approve \$2,313,719,590 in supplementary appropriations for the current fiscal year.

The committee topped off a total of 60 per cent of those funds, giving approval to only \$905,572,920 in extra money.

The committee even cut the President's funds. It rejected in full a request for \$75,000 for the President's Council of Economic Advisors (CEA) and approved instead a \$25,000 fund for the President to appoint an economic adviser and an economic advisory staff.

A request for \$350,000 for the President's emergency fund was chopped down to \$75,000. Committee members said there is an adequate balance in this fund.

Gloria Swanson Says New Depth Films Won't Last

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Gloria Swanson threw a damper today on Hollywood's enthusiasm for new-dimensional films.

"They will be a flash in the pan," she remarked. "After the novelty is over, the film industry will be faced with the same big problems."

But her report was not all pessimism. She painted a rosy picture of America of the future with bigger, happier families enjoying a homier life.

Miss Swanson is uniquely equipped for commenting on the film industry. She is one of Hollywood's all-time great stars and has spent the majority of her years in and around the film business. But she has remained detached enough from the movie whirl to keep it in perspective.

"After I made 'Sunset Boulevard' in 1950," she told me, "I went on a 33-city tour to explain the picture. I talked to people in all walks of life and learned some startling things about the picture business."

"One of the things I learned was that the older generations had abandoned the movies. They could no longer identify themselves with movies since they could not see their favorites of their own age. Hollywood aimed its appeal at youth and neglected the millions of more mature citizens."

"We in TV are not going to stand still either," she remarked, referring to movie-TV competition. "After all, we haven't even gotten to color yet, and 3-D is a possibility. I believe some day every home will have a TV picture the size of a wall in a living room. While people will still go to the movies, life again will be lived in the home. The concentration of the industry will be on TV."



"Another thing I found out—it was just too much trouble and expense for many people to go out to the movies. It's a major production for a couple to attend a theater. There's the babysitter and often a long drive in the theater and the trouble of parking and the admission fee and so forth. No wonder people are staying home to watch TV."

"The industry will still have to face these problems when the thrill of new-dimensional movies has passed. That's why I think the only real future for films is in developing some kind of box to collect money for movies on TV. But even then the industry may have trouble. People are too accustomed to having so much entertainment free."

It's odd that after all these years, Miss Swanson identifies herself with TV, not pictures. She is going to star on NBC's "Hollywood Opening Night" and to make some TV films for the Bing Crosby outfit.
