Willamette, Whitman Win

Willamette University and Whitman moved up in Northwest Conference basketball standings Monday night after victories over College of Idaho and Linfield.

Willamette edged College of Idaho 72-71 at Caldwell and replaced the Idaho team in second place behind Idaho and Clark. Whitman's 77-66 victory over Linfield tied the Missionaries with the Idaho five in third place.

Jim Henkle, a substitute forward, put Willamette in the win column with a field goal with only 15 seconds remaining. After a second quarter College of Idaho led until Henkle connected with his two-pointers.

Whitman also came from behind for its third straight conference win at Walla Walla. Linfield led 32-30 at halftime, but Whitman pulled ahead in the third and fourth quarters and was out in front 60-44 midway of the final period.

Leading scorers in the two games were R. C. Owens of College of Idaho, 23 points; Dick Fain of Whitman, 17; Pete Reed of Willamette, 17, and Grant Schiewe of Linfield, 12.

CHAPEL HILL, N. C. (AP)—Carl Snively is no longer looking for rugged tackles and fleet halfbacks. Instead, he has his lines out for all things, rare old books.

That's his new job at the University of North Carolina, given to him when he resigned last December as head football coach and requested that he be "assigned other duties in physical education or athletics."

For recreation the veteran head coach of twenty-six campaigns, ten of them here, doubtless still sneaks a look at football movies now and then, and doodles dream plays in his notebooks.

He was in the game too long to be divorced completely from aspects of coaching. Also, there still is a possibility he will return to the field.

Dr. O. K. Cornwell, chairman of the Department of Physical education and athletics, said Snively has been delegated the task of assembling a sports library for the university. Cornwell, who conceived the idea of such a library long before Snively's break with the university in football coaching, thinks the project is the most ambitious of its kind ever attempted.

Greenberg Gun-Shy Hank Still Rues Minoso Trade

NEW YORK (AP)—Baseball men say that Hank Greenberg, Cleveland's general manager, has been gun-shy of trades since he made the unhappy deal of two seasons ago which let Orestes Minoso, the Cuban flash, get away to the Chicago White Sox.

It was the acquisition of Minoso which, probably more than any other one factor, set the Sox charging up from the American League depths into a position of contention for the flag. Manager Paul Richards built his go-go team around the speedy Negro.

"The beating Hank took on that one has left him permanently scared," a rival league official told us last night. "He's afraid to even talk trade nowadays. He knows he needs help, but he just keeps hoping that the team he has will somehow beat out the Yanks. Like others before him, Hank is scared to tamper with a second-place club."

"If he would look it up, he would discover that a team which finishes second very seldom wins the pennant the next year. Usually they make the big jump up from third or fourth. That's why the White Sox are the outfit to watch this year."

NIT Eyes Seattle

NEW YORK (AP)—Having bagged LaSalle, the defending champion and fourth ranking team in the country, the National Invitation basketball tournament promoters Tuesday set their sights on three other top drawing cards: Seton Hall, Seattle and Western Kentucky.

The NIT, in signing the Explorers, thus won the first round in its battle with the NCAA to attract the best teams in the country. In past years, a school could play in both, but this time the NCAA decreed one or the other.

The NCAA wanted LaSalle, so the choice was left to the members of the team, who decided they would prefer the NIT because it was closer to their Philadelphia home. They did not like the travel involved in the NCAA tournament.

Both Seton Hall and Niagara definitely have received feelers for the NIT, and the feeling is that Seton Hall, the only major undefeated team in the country, will accept for the same reason as LaSalle.

There are 23 teams in the NCAA tournament, including 14 conference champions, who might or might not be of top drawer caliber. Mitigating against the NCAA is the fact that some of the crack outfits would get in as "at large" teams, meaning they are not members of a conference, and would have to play a preliminary contest.

Seton Hall, Niagara and LaSalle all fall in this category, and would be running the risk of being whipped before the tournament even started.

West Team Gets Noe

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—University of Oregon center Chet Noe will play for the West in the annual East-West basketball game at New York's Madison Square Garden March 28.

Noe received an invitation Monday from Branch McCracken, coach of the West team. He will report for practice March 23.

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
