## Palmer New UAL Manager

C. L. (Cy) Palmer, a veteran of 24 years in the air transport industry, has been assigned as new station manager of the United Air Lines here, according to an announcement by H. J. SEATTLE (AP) - Allied airmen said Thursday they are hitting the Communists where it hurts—but are running out of lucrative targets in North Korea. The Air Force lets the Reds rebuild their shattered war plants, then sends its pilots back to knock them down again. Savage trip-hammer blows by nearly 600 Allied fighter-bombers Wednesday and Thursday ravaged a Communist tank and infantry training center near Pyongyang. Lt. Col. Brad Evans of Palo Alto, Calif., said "there's a scarcity of lucrative targets" and "in many cases we have to wait for the Communists to build them up." "We let the enemy expend maximum labor and money to rebuild these areas, then we hit them." He referred specifically to industrial targets and troop and supply buildup areas. As for rail lines, roads, trucks and similar targets, Evans said, "we have to go back all the time and keep hitting them. There will always be those kinds of targets. The enemy is always trying to bring up supplies." The spokesman said the Reds have no usable airfields in North Korea because "we keep them knocked out."

## War Suspects Get Amnesty

PARIS (AP) - The French National Assembly voted amnesty Thursday to free 12 of the 14 Alsatians sentenced last week for their part in the wartime massacre of 642 persons in Oradour-sur-Glane village. The 12 to be freed had been sentenced to prison terms of five to 12 years. The Justice Committee of Parliament's advisory upper house, the Council of the Republic, soon after returned an unfavorable report on the measure but the full council was expected to approve it. The clemency-exempting from punishment all Frenchmen who were forced into German service during World War II and committed war crimes on German orders—will not benefit the other two Alsatians convicted. They volunteered for the German SS Elite Guard.

## Bandits Get Police Eye

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10 (AP)—The Mexican Tourist Association has asked President Ruiz Cortines to take drastic steps to halt holdups and robberies of North American tourists. The powerful association asked for an immediate investigation into recent violence, saying that not only was the tourist trade being endangered, but Mexico itself was getting a bad name as an uncivilized nation. Three of the holdups have occurred within a month between Mexico City and the pyramids at San Juan Teotihuacan. Each of the pyramid robberies took place at about the same locality, and involved two men and a woman, the latter apparently the leader of the gang.

## French Show Photo Of Red

PARIS (AP)—The French Communist newspaper L'Humanite prominently displayed today what it described as a recent photograph of Maurice Thores, secretary general of the French Communist party who went to Russia more than two years ago for medical treatment. The caption under the three-column page 1 picture—showing Thores and his wife, Communist leader Jeanette Vermeersch, seated out of doors at the foot of some steps—said the secretary general was in "excellent" health. Thores, however, looked a little thinner and older than when he left Paris Nov. 11, 1950, bound for Moscow to be treated for a paralytic stroke. The caption said the photograph was made Feb. 1 of this year.

"We let the enemy expend maximum labor and money to rebuild these areas, then we hit them." He referred specifically to industrial targets and troop and supply buildup areas. As for rail lines, roads, trucks and similar targets, Evans said, "we have to go back all the time and keep hitting them. There will always be those kinds of targets. The enemy is always trying to bring up supplies." The spokesman said the Reds have no usable airfields in North Korea because "we keep them knocked out."

## Another B-36 Goes Up In Fire

ROSWELL, N. M. (AP)—Twenty-two airmen escaped unhurt when a B-36 caught fire near the end of its landing roll shortly before midnight and burned to the ground. A spokesman at Walker Air Force Base said the commander of the giant six-engine bomber told him two engines burst into flame as the craft rolled to a stop. The big bomber, of the 71st Strategic Reconnaissance Wing, was on a routine training flight from Rapid City Air Force Base in South Dakota. A board was appointed at Walker AFB to look for the cause of the fire.
