## Brando's Film Retirement Big Surprise to Hollywood

**HOLLYWOOD** — The movie town has learned to expect anything from Marlon Brando. But folks were surprised to learn he will wind up his film career after one more picture.

"I'm always leary of actors who announce that they are giving up the movies after a certain number of pictures. So I pinned Brando down on his decision and learned that he is earnest about it. 'I'm not saying I'll never see Hollywood again,' he remarked. 'Nobody can foresee the future that well. But my present plan is to do 'Pat Joey' this fall. In the fall of 1954, I'll take an extended trip around the world that will last a year. After that, I'll confine my acting to the stage."

"This is the result of a long-term plan. I got what I wanted out of pictures. I was able to buy a ranch for my folks in Nebraska and provide a nest egg for myself. Now I can do the things I

want to do."

Brando has won two Academy nominations ("A Streetcar Named Desire," "Viva Zapata!") out of the three pictures he has had released. He is reported a clinch to be an Oscar nominee again for his Mark Antony in "Julius Caesar."

Despite these honors, he says he doesn't like movie acting.

"It is a hit-or-miss affair," he remarked. "Anybody who does a good performance manages it by pure luck. There are too many elements against you."

"If you're doing a dramatic scene, you're not able to build up to it. Rehearsals are inadequate, and you have to jump right into the scene. Then you may have to sustain a dramatic mood during the whole working day. That's hard to do."

He added that the stage has more freedom from censorship, thus giving freer rein to the artist. He cited his current picture, "The

Wild One," a story about how a band of wild-riding motorcycleists take over a small town.

"There were 15 different pressure groups that didn't want this picture made," he commented. "Everything from women's groups to motorcycle clubs came out against it. This was the most robust the movie industry has ever seen."

"The picture is a job of 'bravery' and 'ridiculousness,' the kind of the genre I possessed."
