**Britain To Cut Costs**  
 (AP)—Britain's Conservative government plans to trim more than 700 million dollars off the cost of running its departments during the coming fiscal year.  
 The saving will be offset, in part at least, by a jump in the cost of the nation's armed forces and by other as-yet-unannounced spending.  
 The figures were disclosed last night in Chancellor of the Exchequer's estimate of funds to be allotted government departments in the national budget for the 1963-64 fiscal year. The total budget will be announced some time before Easter.  
 Butler predicted a slash of 264 million pounds (\$711,300,000) in the expenses of the civil ministries and the Defense Department. Mounting rearmament costs, however, will force an increase of 189 million pounds (\$508,200,000) in the cost of the Army, Navy and Air Force.  
 Although these estimates indicate there will be some drop in the total cost of the government, there is no way of calculating the exact amount yet. The estimates do not include the cost of servicing the national debt—expected to be up during the coming year because interest rates are rising.

**Withholding Probe Slated**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Mack (R-Wash.) said Tuesday he is investigating reports that Oregon income tax payments are being withheld from government paychecks of Washington State residents who work at Bonneville Dam.  
 Protests against the practice have been received, he said, from 57 dam employees who live in North Bonneville and Stevenson, both in Washington.  
 The dam lies across the Columbia River which forms the boundary between the two states.  
 Mack said many of the employees go back and forth across the dam to work—many of them in the powerhouse which is on the Oregon side of the dam—but do not even touch on land which is taxed by that state.  
 Because employees living in Washington State are subject to that state's three per cent sales tax, Mack said he feels that to make them pay the Oregon income tax amounts to double taxation.  
 Washington has a sales tax but no income tax while Oregon levies against income and has no sales tax.  
 The congressman said he is checking with the Bureau of Internal Revenue and with the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee to see what solution can be worked out.

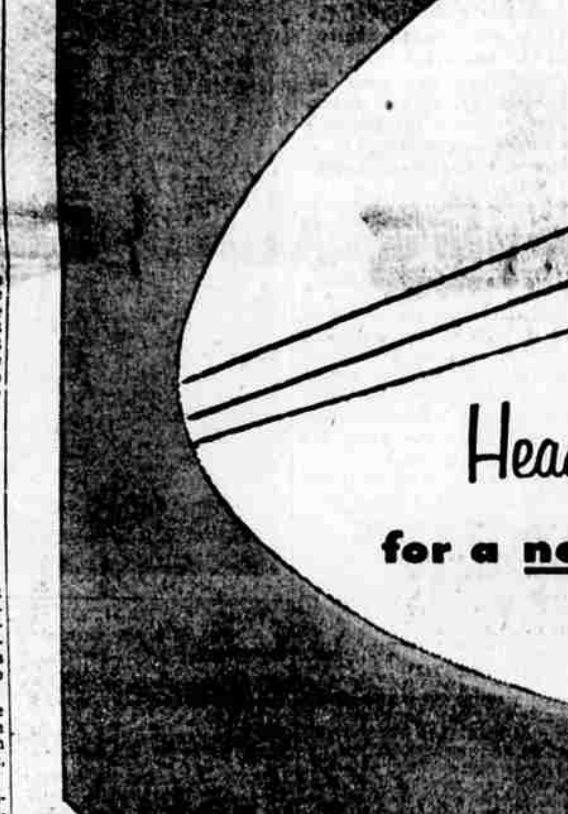

**Forecaster Still Has Job**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Louis H. Bean, the election forecaster who didn't foresee the end of his own job in the Department of Agriculture, can look forward to a new one.  
 Bean was an economic adviser to the secretary of agriculture and charted political outlooks as a hobby.  
 Under the new administration his post was abolished and Bean, a veteran of nearly 30 years government service, said he understood he was to be dismissed without the safeguards provided by civil service.  
 Officials denied this. Last night Bean said the department was lining up a new job for him as a full-time consultant with the Bureau of Agriculture Economics. The salary will be about the same as his former one, \$12,300, he added.

**Pickets Hand In New Petition**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—A written petition has taken the place of the pickets who trudged outside the White House seeking clemency for atom spies Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.  
 The picketing ended yesterday after several hundred persons had joined in the march, climaxed by prayers.  
 Two of the group, who came from New York, Philadelphia and Connecticut, handed a White House policeman a petition asking President Eisenhower to review the case again and direct the attorney general to consent to a new trial.  
 The President has refused to interfere with the carrying out of the death sentence.

# Mossadegh Plans Battle

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh was reported preparing today to accuse Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's court of intriguing against him. He also was said to be planning to ask for a referendum of the Iranian people on his government.

Tehran newspapers declared the Premier planned to air his charges in a radio address that undoubtedly would widen his reported rift with the Iranian monarch. The semi-official newspaper Bahkar Emrooz said the difference involved court budget expenditures and income from real estates.

Court Minister Hussein Ala denied that the court had intrigued against Mossadegh. He said he believed "certain misunderstandings have caused the Premier to imagine that intrigues are being conducted against the government, whereas the Shah has backed the Mossadegh government fully, and the court has given him complete support."
