 WASHINGTON (AP)—The Council of State Chambers of Commerce has proposed that the government transfer to the states the full job of running and financing unemployment compensation and public employment service.
 The proposal is contained in a bulletin to the 32 state and regional chambers of commerce which are members of the council.

Smuggling Ring Broken by Cops
 TOKYO (AP)—Japanese police Wednesday night said they had arrested the ringleader and 16 other members of a multi-million dollar smuggling ring, directed from Red China and with roots in the U.S.
 Kyodo news agency reported.
 Kyodo said several men in the U.S. and 25 in Hong Kong also have been arrested. Details have been given British and American authorities here, the agency said.
 In Hong Kong, Police Commissioner D. W. MacIntosh said "several" persons have been arrested but he declared the smuggling was not as extensive as reported by Kyodo. He declined to give the exact number arrested, but said 25 was too high.

Gen. Van Fleet To Tell of War
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. James A. Van Fleet will give President Eisenhower and key members of Congress next Tuesday a preview of his ideas about winning the Korean War.
 The former Eighth Army commander will attend a special White House session a day before his scheduled appearance before the House and Senate Armed Services Committees, under present plans. Leading members of these committees and of appropriations committees, both Republicans and Democrats.

Caine Mutiny Passes USN Censorship, To Be Filmed

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The embattled USS Caine has survived inspection by the Navy and is ready to set sail on the Hollywood seas.
 That's the report from Stanley Kramer, the producer who owns the film rights to "The Caine Mutiny." The novel, which depicts a mutiny on an American ship during World War II, ranks with "Gone With the Wind" and "The Robe" among the best-selling books of modern times.
 The film version has been the subject of controversy ever since Kramer bought the rights. There had been reports that the Navy brass had declined to fund the picture. The unstable captain of the Caine, Queeg, was depicted as an Annapolis man; it was reported that the Navy insisted that he should be shown as a reservist.
 "I don't know how some of these reports got started," Kramer commented. "They certainly aren't true. The Navy has been very cooperative, and we now have a script which has been approved."
 The character of Queeg remains intact. Nothing has been altered.
 "Of course, the Navy had certain suggestions to make; some

we agreed to, some we argued about. At the outset, they didn't want us to use "mutiny" in the title, but we talked them out of that. We had to make some changes with the character of Lt. Keefer, particularly in some of the lines he delivers.
 "For instance, we couldn't use the line: 'The Navy is a master plan devised by geniuses and executed by idiots.' But we could afford to sacrifice that for the

many other things we were allowed to keep."
 The producer added that the only thing holding up the start of the picture was a decision of what dimensions to shoot it in.
 "A picture like 'The Caine Mutiny' is a natural for 3-D," he remarked. "But I can't decide which technique to shoot it in until I find out which is going to be generally accepted in the theaters."
 Offhand, I would say that the

methods that require glasses will not survive. I think the public will eventually become annoyed with having to wear the glasses.
 "I believe that the big-screen type of picture—Cinerama or Cinemascope—will prevail. But we will have to learn how to use it. It would be too limiting to have the big screen throughout a picture; there would be no chance for closeups or intimate scenes. I believe the regular-size screen will

Draft Evasion Laws Studied

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower has been advised to close the "escape hatch" that permits young men, after being deferred as college students, to miss the draft again by becoming fathers.
 The advice came from the head of a group Eisenhower himself set up when he was president of Columbia University. James D. Zellerbach, chairman of the National Manpower Council, gave it in a radio address last night.
 Zellerbach said he hoped the President would act "to insure equality of sacrifice" and added that the council had found good reason for complaints about the existing student deferment system.

SCRANTON, Pa. (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Angelo Musso stood on the front porch of their suburban Minooka home yesterday and waved as a bus passed by on its way to Ft. Meade, Md.
 Aboard the bus was their son, Mario, 20, the seventh of their sons to serve in the U. S. armed forces.
 Five of Mario's brothers were in World War II and the sixth, Angelo, 22, joined the Air Force in July, 1950.
 Mrs. Musso said: "We feel bad about Mario going away but we're proud down inside."
