CHICAGO (U) — A moderate supply of hogs moved through the yards at 15 to 35 cents a hundred pounds higher values Thursday.

Cattle were steady to 50 cents lower, the decline hitting heifers again, and yearlings were steady to \$1.00 off. Sheep failed to sell sufficiently for an early market test.

Butcher weights of hogs were taken at \$19.25 to \$20.50 in the main. Sows took \$16.25 to \$18.50. Good and choice steers and yearlings brought \$20.50 to \$24.50 but there wasn't much around of better quality. Good and choice heifers were down to \$19.00 to \$22.50. Cows topped at \$16.00.

Receipts of all cattle were 430 compared to 150 last week and 400 a month ago. Increased receipts met with good demand and steady prices.

SLAUGHTER CATTLE: Commercial cows averaged about 16.75 with utility kinds a round 15.25 and canners and cutters turning from 11.50 to 14.30. Good and most of commercial steers sold from 18.40 to 22.00 with utility kinds selling downward to 17.00. Good heifers turned mainly around 21.50 with commercial around 19.50 and utility kinds around 17.00. Commercial bulls sold from 19.00 to 20.00 and utility kinds downward to 16.75. Cutter bulls sold around 15.00. Odd choice veals sold from 26.00 to 28.25. Good slaughter calves turned from 21.35 to 26.50 with commercial kinds turning down to 18.50.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS: Prices were generally steady with increased receipts. Good and choice steer calves weighing from 450 to 500 pounds turned from 20.75 to 22.50. Good steers weighing around 650 pounds turned mainly at 25.50 with heavier kinds around 20.00. Medium steers of all weights sold around 18.00. Good heifers weighing from 400 to 550 pounds sold from 19.50 to 22.10 with medium kinds around 17.50. One large lot of 360-pound medium heifers sold at 70.00 by the head. Young breeding bulls sold from 290.00 to 340.00. Feeder bulls turned from 17.75 to 19.10. Stocker calves weighing around 300 pounds sold around 19.75 per hundred-weight with one lot at 23.80. Stock cows sold from 100.00 to 143.00 and one lot of cows with young calves at side cleared at 205.00. Baby calves of beef breeding and heavy type dairy breeding sold from 11.00 to 47.00 per head with light dairy kinds down to 2.00 each.

SHEEP: A very limited supply of sheep moved with active demand. Good woolers slaughter lambs weighing around 100 pounds turned at 20.10.

HOGS: Receipts of hogs were 38 compared to 41 last week and 67 a month ago. Choice 1 and 2 slaughter hogs topped at 23.30. Sows under 350 pounds sold around 19.00 with heavier sows at 17.70. Boars cleared at 6.20. Weaners pigs weighing around 35 pounds sold from 9.25 to 13.00 with lighter kinds at 6.25 by the head. One piggy sow turned at \$1.00 by the head.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO (U) — Wheat showed occasional flashes of strength on the board of trade Thursday but could not impart any similar spirit to the rest of the grain list.

With Soybeans, corn and oats dragging their feet, wheat eventually gave up an attempt to rally the market. The bread grain fell back to around previous closing levels late in the day.

The sporadic buying in wheat was based largely on pessimistic crop reports concerning the condition of winter wheat in the Southwest.

AFL Wins Mill Labor Contest

TOLEDO, Ore. (U) — The AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union received 339 votes to win bargaining rights for the 500 workers at the C. D. Johnson Lumber Co. mill here.

The CIO International Woodworkers got 123 votes and one vote was cast for no union in results of a National Labor Relations Board election announced Wednesday. One vote was challenged.

Bush Funeral Held in Salem

The funeral today in Salem for A. N. Bush (Asahel II) marked the end of an Oregon banking dynasty. It also ended the long career of a man who, although a "banker's banker," was first of all the "people's banker."

His grandson, Asahel IV (Ace) was with the Herald and News for several years; starting in the classified and was night editor prior to leaving for Salt Lake City with the Associated Press Bureau. Later he was transferred to San Francisco, and from there he went to Levee as an AP correspondent, where he was killed in a Japanese night bombing raid.

While here he married Faye Cornish DeSpain and they had a daughter, Jody. His widow married Rudolph M. Liversley, member of a prominent Salem family a few years ago, and has since made her home there.

She was at the bedside of "Grandpa Bush" when he died in the old family home, Tuesday.

The historic Bush home and surrounding 100 acres will include a public park and Willamette University athletic field. The house proper is to be a state museum.

On Saturday night, March 7, a crab feed and entertainment is scheduled, with past governors Roger Wright and Al Nyback in charge. The crab feed is by reservation only and all reservations must be in by Saturday. The price is \$2 per person.

Members having a candidate for the March 8 class of initiates to the lodge will get a free ticket to the crab feed.

On Sunday, March 8, there will be an initiation, honoring state officers, with dutch lunch following. The program will be directed by Past Governor Cap Verbeck and trustee Chauncey Chappel.

Editors Plan Foreign Tour

WASHINGTON (U) — Director Harold Stassen of the Mutual Security Administration told a group of newspaper and radio editors Thursday the most significant things to look for as they tour Europe are the security efforts which are under way.

Approximately 35 of the editors are leaving New York Friday by plane for Berlin. Speaking to them at a breakfast, Stassen also directed their attention to efforts to get community treaties ratified and to the European army plan for which he said this country is prepared to furnish military equipment.

Walter Williams, undersecretary of commerce, never told the editors America never was confronted with graver times and advised them that preserving and strengthening a sound economy is an important way to meet the challenge to national security.

The group also arranged for meetings with Vice President Nixon and with Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.).

Included in the group are Mrs. Elsie B. Aldrich, of the East Oregonian, Pendleton, Ore.; and Mr. and Mrs. Julius Gius, of the Bremerton Sun, representing John P. Scripps newspapers in Washington and California.

More Nixon Funds Aired

NEW YORK (U) — The New York Post said Thursday that funds raised in behalf of Vice President Richard Nixon "were far more extensive than the \$18,000 trust fund exposed during the presidential campaign."

The newspaper said that, in addition to the \$18,235 fund, described by Nixon in his television broadcast during the campaign, there were at least two other funds handled in Nixon's behalf by Dana C. Smith, Nixon's California supporter.

The Post said one was a special fund totaling \$25,056.83, reported to the clerk of the House of Representatives by Smith last Dec. 29. It said no records were kept of the other fund because it said this money was transmitted immediately to organizations directly engaged in political financing.

Contacted at his Pasadena, Calif. office, Smith said he had no comment on the Post story.

"I filed my report with the House of Representatives," he said, "Anyone who wants to know anything else should submit the questions in writing to the vice president's office. If he asks me to answer them, I will. Everything is in writing on the record."

Many Potatoes Remain Here

Between 2,000 and 3,000 carloads of potatoes are estimated as remaining unshipped in the Klamath Basin, according to statistics released today by the Oregon Department of Agriculture's shipping point inspection service here.

About 11,000 cars were produced in this area during the past season, and there are still lots of cellars remaining with good lots of potatoes in them.

Pricewise, spuds have dropped considerably from recent surges on the local market, though shipments were above the 50 mark yesterday. They had dropped below 30 on some recent days.

A year ago little over a dozen cars per day were on the shipping lists because OPS ceilings had halted many sales, and rolled back earlier prices as much as 3 per cent.
