Coast Guard Saves Fliers

WASHINGTON (AP) - A crippled Navy patrol plane crash landed in the mid-Atlantic Friday and all 10 men aboard were picked up by the Coast Guard Cutter Coots Bay.

The Navy said that four of the men were rescued from the water and six from a raft carried by the plane. The Navy reported no injuries among the survivors.

The patrol plane, which was about half way between Bermuda and the Azores Islands, landed in a sea that had been whipped by 30-mile an hour winds.

The Coast Guard cutter had been sent to the area after the plane, a P-2V reported it was having engine trouble. A patrol plane also was ordered to stand by over the scene.

During the last hour of the crippled plane's flight, its progress was tracked on the radar of the Coots Bay and by other vessels in the Atlantic.

The rescue operations were com- pleted within two hours after the plane first reported it was in dif- ficulty.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Commis- sioner of Internal Revenue T. Coleman Andrews said today "steps have been taken to assure that all nec- essary functions of the revenue service are carried out."

Andrews made the statement after reports from three revenue districts that funds were running so low agents could not carry out duties involving automobile travel or long-distance telephone calls.

The reports came from Birming- ham, Ala., Greensboro, N. C., and Albany, N. Y.

Andrews added:

"I want to say that the bureau is aware of these situations which result from restrictions placed on all operating revenue officials so as to assure maximum use of ex- isting funds for the balance of this fiscal year."

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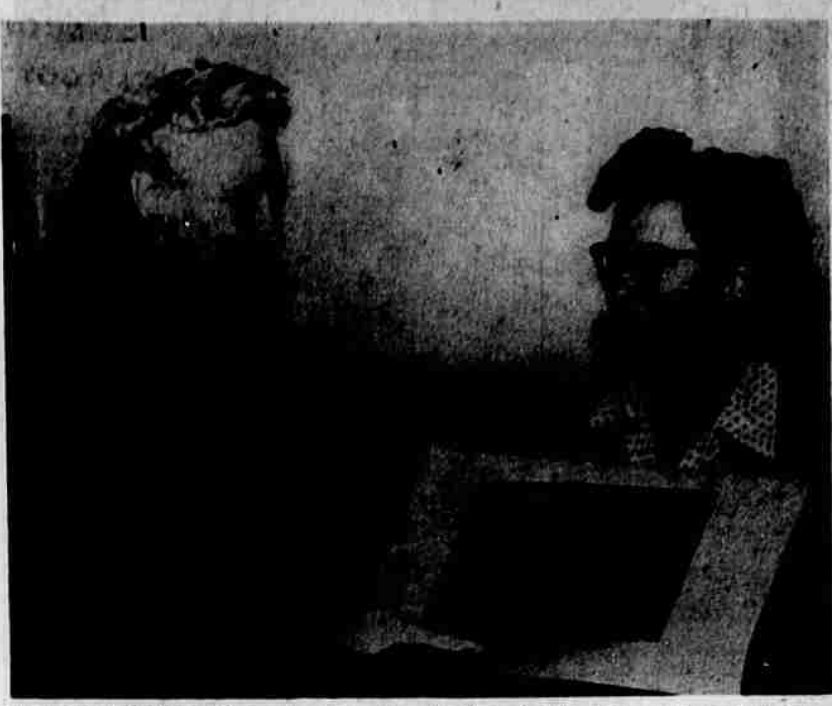

Timber Bill Gets Study

WASHINGTON (AP) - Legislation to make standing timber accept- able as national bank loan collater- al is being studied, an aid of Sen. Cordon (R-Ore) said Thursday.

Cordon conferred recently with Marshall Dana of the U. S. National Bank, Portland, Ore.; Forester Stewart Moir and representatives of the comptroller of currency, on the question.

Dana is chairman of a special committee named by the Oregon Bankers Association to work on the proposal.

The conference developed that legislation would be needed, since a broader interpretation of the present collateral law would not ac- complish the desired results. Under the present law improved real estate may be used as collateral, but standing timber may not.

Benson Asks Wheat Confab

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of Agriculture Benson invited 42 representatives of the wheat in- dustry to meet with him Monday to consider new ways of stabilizing wheat production and prices.

Included were representatives of various segments of the industry from growers to millers.

With foreign markets falling off, the country faces the prospect of burdensome surpluses of wheat unless production is reduced or new markets are developed.

Likely to be discussed are prop- osals for a two-price system under which farmers themselves would offer extra supplies abroad at lower prices than in this coun- try.

At the present time, wheat is being sold abroad at lower prices than in this country, but the government makes up the difference in the form of export subsidies.

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Senate Seeks Billboard Regulation

SALEM (AP) - The Senate Natural Resources Committee will recom- mend unanimously that billboards on highways be regulated.

Sen. Philip S. Hitchcock, Klam- ath Falls, committee chairman, said the committee decided unani- mously to send such a bill to the Senate floor.

It might be a new bill, or the committee might amend the bill sponsored by the Oregon Roadside Council.

Anti-billboard bills have been in- troduced in recent sessions, but they have succumbed to the strong opposition of the billboard industry.

"There are too many bill- boards," Sen. Hitchcock said, "and lots of them are decrepit and fall- ing down. The people want them to be regulated."

"If you want to drive in the country, you want to see the coun- try, not the billboards."

"If the billboard industry had wanted to make a real effort, it could have regulated the billboards itself. But it won't, so the Legis- lature will have to do it."

Untagged Meat Leads to Jail

Berford Vernon Hyatt, convicted earlier this week in District Court on a charge of illegal possession of untagged deer meat, this morn- ing was sentenced to 90 days in the County Jail.

A fine of \$250 also was assessed. Hyatt had been free on \$500 also bail for several weeks pending the trial and sentencing, but was booked into the jail today.

Suit Filed On Equipment Pay

A suit to recover equipment sent to the Bobco Paving Company and not paid for was instituted in Cir- cuit Court this morning by the Howard-Cooper Corporation.

The legal proceeding seeks im- mediate recovery of an L-8 White asphalt plant and an Esack roller sold to the paving company last September and considered to be worth about \$7,500.

The Bobco Paving Company was formed last year and last summer had a contract with the City of Klamath Falls for street patching. The city work was not completed. The law firm of Farrens and Maxwell filed the suit.

Court Dismisses Liquor Charges

Mitchell had been accused of giving liquor to two 15-year-old Indian girls who wrecked a car here al- most two weeks ago. The girls are held in the County Jail pending Juvenile Court action.

The charge against Mitchell was dismissed at the request of the district attorney's office.
