Small Businessmen Tell Of Plight
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Small business and industry are beset by "a crushing burden" of taxes and should be granted some relief, the Senate Small Business Committee said yesterday.
 But it did not recommend when such tax cuts should be made, or what size they should be.
 The committee, in a report to the Senate, said many big firms are nearing completion of defense contracts let after the Korean War began, and that small firms which hold subcontracts "will be the first to feel the cutbacks."

South Korean Boss Urges Victory
 SEOUL (AP)—South Korea's defense minister today declared, "Our task for this year is to fly our flag from the top of Paik Tu Mountain" on the Yalu River border of Manchuria.
 Shin Tai Yung made this statement to 2,000 Seoul students at a sendoff for 750 high school graduates who will attend the republic's Army cadet schools.
 "We must destroy the 38th parallel and march on to the Yalu and Tumen Rivers, I, as defense minister, promise you that this can be done," he asserted.

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Hollywood Agog Over Miss Monroe, But That's All

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Joan Crawford today aimed this curt message at Marilyn Monroe: Stop believing your publicity.

The curvaceous blonde has been the subject of a hot controversy during the past fortnight. Women's clubs have protested about the nature of her publicity and the advertising photos for her pictures. When I addressed the Women's Club of Hollywood a week ago, the members were eager to know what the producers were doing to curb Miss Monroe.

Adding fuel to the fire were reports that her latest picture, the first with which she could demonstrate her box-office pull, was doing disappointing business. Then there was her much publicized appearance at the Photoplay awards dinner.

Miss Monroe showed up in a slipper-like metallic gown into which she had to be sewn. When she stepped up to get her award as the outstanding new personality on the screen, she put on a hip-swinging display that brought the house down.

"It was like a burlesque show," said the horrified Miss Crawford, who was present at the affair. "The audience yelled and shouted, and Jerry Lewis got up on the table and whistled. But those of us in the industry just shuddered."

"Certainly her picture isn't doing business, and I'll tell you why. Sex plays a tremendously important part in every person's life. People are interested with it, intrigued with it. But they don't like to see it flaunted in their faces."

"Kids don't like her. Sex plays a growingly important part in their lives, too, and they don't like to see it exploited."

"And don't forget the women. They're the ones who pick out the movie entertainment for the family. They won't pick anything that won't be suitable for their husbands and children."

The durable Miss Crawford, who has lasted longer than any film star in history, said the Monroe buildup was clever and well planned. It was the work of master exploiters, she remarked, but it got out of hand.

"The publicity has gone too far," she said. "And apparently Miss Monroe is making the mistake of believing her publicity. Someone should make her see the light. She should be told that the public likes provocative feminine personalities, but it also likes to know that underneath it all the actresses are ladies."

The Crawford comments were read to Miss Monroe and she was asked if she cared to say anything.

PERSECUTION

ATHENS, Greece (AP)—Reports reaching Salonika by way of the Greek border town of Kastoria Monday said wholesale and relentless anti-Jewish persecution now is rife in Communist Albania.

Game Group Opposed To Graze Act

Through its chairman, Kenneth Denman of Medford, the Oregon Game Commission has announced its opposition to the proposed "Uniform Federal Grazing Land Tenancy Act."

The act, sponsored by the Stockmen's Grazing Committee representing Western livestock interests, is aimed at a revision of federal grazing controls on public lands.
 In effect, the Game Commission believes the proposed grazing act would extend the principle of special interest legislation to the national forest lands. On some public lands, for example, grazing is given recognition as the primary use.

Another of the commission's principal objections is to a section of the grazing land tenancy act that would change grazing on the national forests from a permit status to a vested right.

The commission also feels all individual limitations of livestock numbers could be lifted, and protective measures established by the U. S. Forest Service to safeguard watersheds from overgrazing and erosion would be weakened under the proposed act.

Although the act is worded to the effect that watershed grazing, water rights, hunting and fishing, and other uses on national forests are not to be infringed upon, the commission foresees a danger to these uses because overgrazing could destroy watershed values by removing the forage and natural cover required by wildlife and seriously effect stream flows that are vital for maintenance of fish and the public welfare.

In taking its stand against the proposed "Uniform Federal Grazing Land Act," the commission also pictured the act as an opening wedge that could eventually destroy present laws and policies governing national forests whereby watershed values, timber, recreation, wildlife, and grazing are all given equitable consideration.

Boston Schools May Be Probed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee may conduct public hearings on alleged Communist infiltration in the educational field in the Boston area.

A subcommittee spokesman who declined to be named said the matter is under discussion now, and he expects an early decision. He said if hearings are ordered, some probably would be held in Boston.

The subcommittee now is studying charges of Communist infiltration of schools and colleges in the New York area.



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
