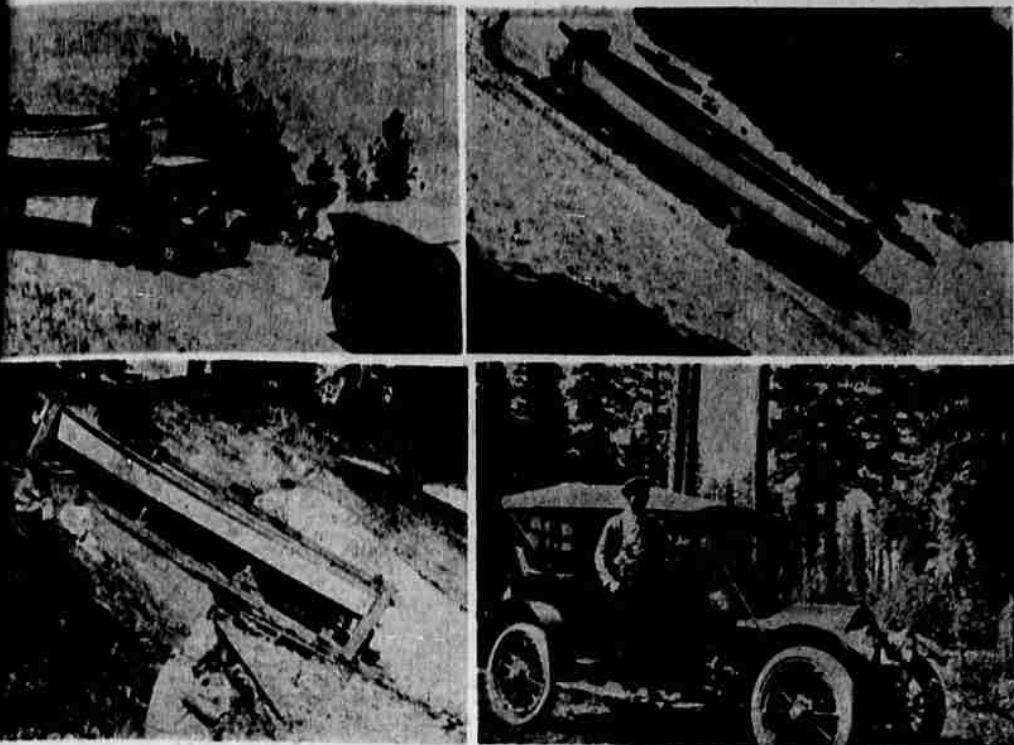




A BOAT INTO CRATER LAKE was, and is, quite a sight. These pictures show one of the first of the motor boats being lowered to the lake in 1924. Upper left shows the boat being lowered down the steep rim and the lower right is the 1913 Cadillac owned by Telford that was used to tow the truck and boat when the truck's power proved inadequate. The boat, in a cradle, was lowered at a spot slightly west of the rim where the going is so open you can ride a horse down to the rim of the blue lake. It took five men and 1200 feet of inch and an eighth rope to get done. When the boat was at the edge of the lake it rested on a couple of logs ready for launching the next day, all complete with seat cushions and all. Ray

Telford, who built the boat, set a pot of tallow on the seats to be used in greasing the skids the next day for the launching. That night a bear boarded the launch, ate the tallow and trampled all over the cushions. So it was a dry launching. The boat was later lost as a result of a snowslide. All the Crater Lake boats, built for R. W. Price, were kept in a boathouse on Wizard Island but on the opposite side from the present house. During the winter a snow slide wiped out the building and swept the launch and several smaller boats into the lake. As the drain plugs had been pulled out of the boat it waterlogged and swamped. What was left of the launch was located by Wilfred Telford, Ray's brother, who knew the lake currents well. He found the boat, ground to bits, on the beach at Cleatwood cove. The engine was recovered from three feet of water and later used in another launch built for Crater Lake. — Pictures from Telford

Mossadegh Considers Test Vote

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh reportedly considered asking Parliament for a vote of confidence today as the nation's legislators met behind heavy armed guard. The aged government chief appealed to his people to return to work after a week of riotous demonstrations. Tehran appeared relatively calm after the outburst of street fighting precipitated by gangs of demonstrators that rallied to the support of Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi when it appeared Mossadegh might force the 33-year-old monarch to leave the country.

Premier and Ayatollah Beyed Abolghassem Kashani, the fanatical Moslem religious leader who is speaker of the Chamber of Deputies, Kashani is generally credited with sparking Saturday's demonstration that induced the Shah to cancel plans to leave the country.



Python Tries Baby Theft

DARWIN, Australia (AP)—An arrival from the sparsely populated "never never" country of Northern Australia told today how a 3-month-old baby girl was saved there recently from the jaws of a huge python.

This was the story related by J. A. Quirk, field inspector for a local firm. A half-caste aborigine, Alex Scott, was camped with his wife and baby in a truck while the man was building a stockyard in a remote section of a large Ord River cattle ranch.

One night, when Scott was out of the truck, his wife awoke. Suddenly, she felt her baby's feet near her own, but moving away from her, and then felt the great snake, which swallows its prey. At her scream the father raced to the truck. By the beam of his flashlight, he saw that most of his child's face was inside the jaws of the python, which was moving off the truck.

Scott hit the python with a stick and it freed the child. Later the snake was found curled inside a 44-gallon drum.

The baby was treated for huge fang marks on its face but otherwise was unharmed.
