Council OK's Withdrawal

The City Council last night okayed a resolution calling for withdrawal from the Oregon public employees retirement system, in accordance with the expressed wishes of a majority of city workers.

To permit withdrawal, a minimum of 75 per cent of the eligible employees of a governmental unit must petition to be let out of the system's coverage.

Somewhat more than 75 per cent of Klamath Falls workers have signed notarized petitions to the effect that they want out. The plan operated system and to get under federal social security.

Klamath County employees withdrew last month.

Reason for the withdrawals is that the state system is costly to both workers and the governmental unit—some city employees now pay over \$300 a year into it—and the benefits may not be as great in many instances as under social security, which has a maximum cost to workers of \$54 a year.

Of the eligible city workers, 76 have signed petitions of withdrawal, and 11 want to stay within the state retirement system.

Klamath Lease Bids Invited

The Bureau of Reclamation is now inviting bids for the leasing of 87 lots of public land in the Frog Pond, League of Nations, Klamath Straits, and Sheepy Lake East areas of the Klamath Project,

according to an announcement today by E. L. Stephens, project manager. Leases are offered for the balance of the calendar year 1953 only, with no option to renew.

Bids will be received at the Klamath Project office until 10 a.m. March 16, at which time they will be publicly opened.

Bidders will be required to comply with the same conditions as those who were awarded leases in the Southwest Swamp last week. A sworn statement of operations on a form furnished with the advertisement for bids must be completed and attached to the bid proposal. Veterans will receive preference, as in the past.

Row crops will be limited to 25 per cent of the area of each lot and cannot be planted on the same portions where row crops were grown last year. Some of the units offered for leasing are not suitably situated for growing of row crops.

Copies of the advertisement for bids will be available at the Bureau of Reclamation offices in Klamath Falls and Newell.

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
