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Vikings Whip Techs

Owls On Shy End Of 84-73

Oregon Tech needs a cage win over Portland State tonight to capture third place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

The Vikings dumped the Owls, 84-73, last night in the first of a two-game series and a repeat for State tonight would give both teams season-ending 4-8 records.

Eastern Oregon won the title with a 9-3 mark after Portland State was forced to forfeit two wins over the Mountaineers when they used an ineligible player, Oregon College of Monmouth finished second.

Jerry Wyatt did his share last night with 10 field goals and eight free throws for 28 points.

But Portland State's Don Schuberg with 21 and Don MacLean with 20 paced the Vikings to victory.

The first quarter was touch-and-go, but Schuberg broke a 17-all tie early in the second quarter with a jump shot and the Vikings built their 19-17 lead to 44-40 at the half, never relinquishing the lead the rest of the way.

It was 63-50 going into the fourth quarter. The Owls out-scored the Vikings in the last period but they had too far to go.

Tom Schubert finished with 15, Chuck Jepsen added 14.

NEW YORK (AP)—St. Louis University entered the National Invitation Basketball Tournament today free of any strings and Brigham Young, another tentative acceptor, appeared virtually certain to show up.

A closing-second field goal by Bob Hendrick of Oklahoma A&M last night simultaneously put the Aggies into the NCAA playoffs and St. Louis into the NIT. The goal gave the Aggies a 51-50 victory over St. Louis and their seventh Missouri Valley championship in 10 years.

PLAYOFF Until its defeat, St. Louis had a chance to share the title and conference rules call for a playoff which would have kept the Billikins out of NIT competition. The Bills accepted an NIT bid Saturday with the privilege of backing out if they became involved in a conference playoff.

Meanwhile, Eddie Kimball, director of athletics at Brigham Young, said he hoped a possible Skyline Conference tie with Wyoming could be settled either by a flip of a coin or by a conference action. The champion is obligated to play in the NCAA Tournament, BYU, which holds a mathematical chance to tie with Wyoming, was invited to the NIT yesterday, completing the 12-team field.

TWO MORE Two more NCAA entries may be determined tonight from the South and Border Conferences. Texas and Texas Christian, which are in a three-way tie for the lead with Rice, play each other while Rice meets Southern Methodist. The two games are the last on the conference schedule.

Hardin-Simmons meets Texas Tech tonight needing a victory to tie with Arizona for the Border crown. Arizona finished its schedule last night with a 65-51 decision over West Texas.

KINER, DARK, DOBY, WYNN WON'T BUDGE

Four of baseball's top stars still were among the missing in spring training today and the prospects of their signing in the immediate future appeared slim.

The Cleveland Indians are faced with the biggest problem. Both outfielder Larry Doby and pitcher Early Wynn have yet to come to terms, and they have been served with ultimatums by General Manager Hank Greenberg.

The New York Giants' captain, Alvin Dark, said at his Lake Charles, La., home that the front office was being "unfair," and that he intends to sit still.

And Ralph Kiner of the Pittsburgh Pirates and General Manager Branch Rickey apparently have reached an impasse in their battle of words that has covered thousands of miles from Havana to Palm Springs, Calif.

Greenberg apparently won't be troubled with second baseman Bobby Avila, who is listed among the holdouts, much longer. For one thing, he didn't include Bobby in his warning to Doby and Wynn, and for another, Avila announced in his Vera Cruz, Mexico, home that he would join the Indians later this week.

Greenberg had this to say via telegram to Doby and Wynn: "Your failure to report to camp today makes you an official holdout. Considering generous treatment you have had from Cleveland baseball club over the years, your refusal to accept terms leaves me no alternative but to withdraw my last offer. Unless I hear from you within 24 hours all contractual negotiations will commence with last year's salary figures."

Switches Few In Prep Poll

The Dalles, now facing a playoff for the right to enter the state class A high school basketball tournament, still ranks as the No. 1 team in the weekly Associated Press poll.

For the fifth consecutive week The Dalles heads the list of Oregon teams, although it was not unanimous this time. One first-place vote went to Redmond, ranked No. 2 in this week's poll. The other 19 votes from sports writers and sportscasters went to The Dalles, undefeated in 22 consecutive games.

The Dalles will play Pendleton next weekend for the right to enter the state tourney.

There was only minor shuffling of the teams in the poll, although one new team appeared on the list of the top 10. That was Cleveland of Portland, back on the list after an absence of two weeks. Cleveland scored two impressive victories in the past week to gain its backing.

Marshallfield, as usual, was the No. 2 team.

Medford, which has been the No. 3 team for the past month, found itself in a tie with Eugene this week for No. 3. Each polled 73 points in the balloting, 20 points behind Marshallfield.

Next came Hillsboro, down a notch after being upset in a first-round game of a district 9 tournament.

Jefferson of Portland held on to the No. 6 position, although defeated by Cleveland. Redmond moved up two positions to No. 7 after defeating Bend, and Gresham held on to the No. 8 spot.

Cleveland got the No. 9 position and Albany was No. 10, dropping from the No. 7 spot of last week. Albany was defeated by Corvallis in the past week.

Dropping off the top 10 was Milwaukie, after being defeated by Central Catholic of Portland.

LaGrande nearly made the top 10, lacking only one point in the voting to gain a tie with Albany. The poll with the season record listed for each team:
