POTATO REPORT, Feb. 4

At Portland today the supply of potatoes was moderate. The demand was fair. Track sales and brokers track sales of Oregon Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, ranged from 3.75 to 3.85 a 100 pound sack. At San Francisco the potato market had a slightly weaker tendency. Brokers track sales of Russets, from Klamath, U.S. No. 1 A, 2 inch minimum size, brought 3.75 to 4.00 a 100 pound sack. Bakers from the Deschutes area, U.S. No. 1 brought 5.00 a 100 pound sack. At Los Angeles long white potatoes were slightly stronger. Russets were steady. Trucklot and carlot sales of Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, ranged from 4.25 to 4.55 a 100 pound sack. The small size russets were as low as 4.00 a sack. Idaho Russets, 6 ounce minimum size, U.S. No. 1, brought 5.35 a 100 pound sack. Klamath russets, U.S. No. 1 A, brought 4.00 a 100 pound sack. At Chicago today the supply of old potatoes was liberal. Russets were in good supply and the market was slightly stronger. Others were slow and the market was dull. Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1 A, 25 to 30 per cent 10 ounce size, brought 5.05 to 5.15 a 100 pound sack. Street sales of U.S. No. 1 A and generally good quality Idaho Russets brought mostly 5.50. A few were quoted at 5.60 a 100 pound sack. At the Yakima shipping point on Tuesday, March 3, there was practically no demand for potatoes. There were too few sales to establish a market or quote prices. At the Idaho Falls shipping point on Tuesday, March 3, potato offerings were moderate. There was moderate inquiry on best stock. The others were slow and the market was about steady. Russets, washed, 25 to 35 per cent 10 ounces and larger, ranged from 2.70 to 3.90 a 100 pound sack. Most of the sales ranged from 3.75 to 3.85 a 100 pound sack. Track holdings of potatoes at the 15 major cities of the nation today amounted to 1089 cars of old potatoes and 95 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 1114 cars of old potatoes and 82 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago. Arrivals today amounted to 319 cars of old potatoes and 45 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 356 cars of old potatoes and 32 cars of new potatoes arriving one week ago. Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation yesterday amounted to 1918 cars. Of this number, the Pacific Northwest shipped 310 cars. Idaho moved 262 cars, Oregon 36 cars, and Washington 10 cars.

West Coast Gets Coos Bay Okay

WASHINGTON (U.S.) — The Civil Aeronautics Board Thursday extended temporarily West Coast Airlines' authority to originate and terminate one round-trip flight daily at North Bend - Coos Bay, Ore., instead of Medford, Ore., provided that at least two scheduled round-trip flights daily originate and terminate at Medford. The board said that on each North Bend-Coos Bay flight, the line may serve Roseburg along the route to and from Eugene. West Coast's authority for such service was to have ended this month.

Archers Open Local Range

A group of Klamath bow-and-arrow enthusiasts who call themselves the Klamath Archers are beginning to lay out a field course for firing at Moore Park. The group has slated an election and reorganizational meeting for next Thursday, 7 p.m., in the Alamo gym. The new field range is to be located near the ski run at Moore Park, according to Archer Pres. Dale Baxter. It covers one of the most rugged sections in the park, an Target Captain Cecil Prather describes it as a "shrewd field." It is laid out like a golf course, with shooting locations set for shot at targets similar to the tee-off points and the greens on a course. As far as others in the park are concerned the course is completely safe, Prather said. The course is to be open for operation as soon as weather conditions permit its completion.

Ship Radio Strike Ends

SAN FRANCISCO (U.S.) — CIO ship radio operators have settled their wage dispute with the Pacific Maritime Association, permitting the Matson luxury liner Lurline to sail for Hawaii Thursday—almost 24 hours late. The radiomen received their requested 9.5 per cent wage increase in negotiations which lasted through most of Wednesday night. The Lurline was thus able to sign on a radio crew and sail. Five passengers meanwhile had cancelled reservations. J. Paul St. Sure, PMA president, said the same pay boost was given to deck officers of the AFL Masters, Mates and Pilots Union, who also had decided to strike. Some 20 West Coast shipping firms will be affected by the PMA's decision. The pay raise is effective as of March 1, but the ship owners held off on the retroactive issue. The union wants the raise to go back to June 15, 1952. Negotiations on this point will continue.

KASRU To Be Inspected

The U.S. Coast Guard, the state Board of Aeronautics and other Oregon aviation officials have slated an inspection of Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit personnel and equipment for tomorrow afternoon. State Director Jack Bartlett of the Board of Aeronautics and Coast Guard personnel are scheduled to fly in here in a military transport about 2:30 p.m. Saturday, and KASRU Pres. Dan Emrick has called for a complete turnout of KASRU forces here. KASRU is considered one of the finer civilian air search and rescue organizations in the West. Saturday evening officials and KASRU members are slated to hold a round-table discussion on improved methods of search and rescue and cooperation between searching agencies. A tape recording is to be made of the event to be rebroadcast over the Oregon Air News radio program. Visiting dignitaries are to leave here Sunday for Pendleton. A statewide mock-air rescue mission is planned with units from throughout Oregon cooperating, with the rescue target to be located somewhere in Eastern Oregon. A number of KASRU members, both ground and air volunteers, have indicated they will travel to Pendleton to participate.
