Such an annexation can be accomplished by resolution of the City Council, providing all the owners of the effected property agree. The sole owner is the United States government. Mayor Landry is to ask permission of the proper governmental agency for annexation.

The annexation has nothing to do with the federal housing projects, which probably will be abandoned and torn down next year.

Last week the council rescinded a 1950 request that the city be allowed to take over and operate the two-story housing apartments, and next week is to rescind previous requests regarding the other two projects.

Man Jailed On Assault

A 29-year-old Chilquin Indian, Harold Nathan Hatcher, is held in the County Jail today on a federal charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

He was arraigned before U.S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas, and bail was set at \$2,500.

Hatcher, whose real name is Harold Hicks, was brought here yesterday from Chilquin by reservation officer Walt Wentz.

He allegedly tried to shoot a Negro, Eddie Stoudamire, with a .35-35 cal. rifle just outside the Chilquin city limits near the old Sprague River dam last Friday.

Stoudamire was able to wrestle the rifle away from Hatcher's hands, and was uninjured. Wentz said he didn't know of any trouble between the two men.

Road Blazes, No Damage

These commercial and service establishments that give annual employment to some 1,844 regular workers, which creates an annual payroll of some \$4,710,500.

Not only does the total retail sales for 1951 indicate that the effective buying income of the residents of the city was spent, in the main, with these firms but, that the advantages of buying in Klamath Falls was realized by hundreds of people living in other sections of Oregon and California.

This statement is substantiated by the fact that the differential between the effective buying income of the residents of the city during that year and the total retail sales made by the Klamath Falls merchants and service institutions was \$22,090,000. There is only one conclusion that can be drawn from this factual analysis which is that the importance of Klamath Falls, as a commercial, industrial and distribution center is rapidly coming to the fore in its own right.

Today, this city is recognized as the wholesale supply source for southern Oregon and northern California consumer goods and industrial supplies. This is due, in a large measure, to its strategic geographical location and good transportation facilities, adequate warehousing and, aggressive commercial and industrial leaders. Wholesale sales for the year 1951 are listed well over 32-millions of dollars.

Every year has shown marked expansion during the last decade which contributes to the stability and permanency of this growth. It is an established fact that the raw materials which are converted into finished goods, in this immediate region, are of a character that will always be in demand regardless of world or national economic conditions.
