Vote Machine Plan Snagged

HALEM (AP) — The House Elections Committee Monday torpedoed a proposal to require counties to issue pocket registration cards, but ran into trouble when it tried to act on a bill authorizing voting machines. The voting machine bill, introduced by Rep. Earl Hill Cushman, would make their use permissive. However, a number of other provisions ran afoul of existing election laws and the committee found it self virtually rewriting the proposal. Hill and Rep. Alfred Corbett, Portland, were named as sub-committee to revise several sections and final committee actions appeared stalled indefinitely. The committee also emasculated a bill by Rep. Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukie, which would permit registration by mail. The bill will be re-printed with half a dozen amendments for reconsideration at the committee's next meeting.

Coffee Supply Tightens Up

NEW YORK (AP) — Coffee supplies are tightening up in some parts of the country, trade sources here conceded Tuesday. But they hastened to add, the situation should ease as soon as price controls are lifted. Persistent rumors that price controls are on the way out have brought "utter confusion" into the orderly processing, distribution and marketing of coffee, industry spokesmen say. And, they assert, while this confusion lasts, some brands may be in short supply in some parts of the country.

Snow Water Near Normal

PORTLAND (AP) — The water content of snow on Oregon mountains is 99 per cent of normal, the Weather Bureau and Soil Conservation Service reported Monday. Well above average snow cover in Southern and Northeastern Oregon is offset by below normal depths in the Southeastern and Willamette Valley areas, the agencies said. The Willamette Basin has 96 per cent of its average snow cover. Only 70 per cent of the normal runoff is expected in the Owyhee River of Southeastern Oregon where the snow cover is 77 per cent of average. The Crooked River area also has a snow cover of 77 per cent of average. In Southwestern Oregon the Upper Rogue will have 116 per cent of normal runoff and the Klamath Lake Basin 140 per cent of average. In the northeast, the Inaha River is expected to have 122 per cent and the Willowa River 110 per cent. The snow cover for the state as a whole is 66 per cent of that measured for this time last year, a year of above normal water supply. Above average precipitation during February in most parts of the state improved the situation, the report said.
