US Businessmen On Flyer In Cloak and Dagger Role; Nab Red Jet Plane Plans

 HAGERSTOWN, Md. (AP) - A former Maryland governor revealed last night how he and two of his wealthy business friends took a financial flyer in free-enterprise espionage which robbed the Communists of a top-secret jet fighter plane.

The amazing financial venture of three highly respected and widely known American businessmen into the cloak-and-dagger land of Eastern Europe espionage circles caused a series of diplomatic upheavals between the Danish government and enraged Polish officials.

The businessmen, all officers of Fairchild Aircraft Company here, are former Gov. William Preston Lane Jr., a member of the Board of Directors; Richard S. Boutelle, president of the firm; and Arthur F. Flood, executive vice president.

A retired Army officer, Col. Ulius (Pete) Amoss, who lives on Gibson Island, a quiet little retreat about 20 miles southeast of Baltimore, master-minded the plan.

The scheme, which began about a year ago, was climaxed March 5 when a Polish Air Force lieutenant landed on the Danish-owned island of Bornholm with a Soviet-built MIG-15 jet fighter plane.

The American businessmen were said to have put up about \$10,000 to finance the phenomenal project. One member of the spy group said Col. Amoss, who formerly headed the Eastern European Division of the Office of Strategic Services, made at least two trips to Europe to lay plans for the venture, which involved no bribing.

His chief of operations was described as a "brilliant intelligence officer, not an American," but was otherwise unidentified.

Just how they did it remains a mystery for "security reasons," but a member of the American spy ring said the Polish flyer's end of the task was done for "patriotic reasons," and not for money.

The flyer, Lt. Franciszek Jarawski, will probably be given the protection of formal recognition as a political refugee on next Monday, according to an announcement last night from the Danish Foreign Office.

Shortly after the young Pole dropped his prize on Western soil, the angry first secretary of the Polish legation at Copenhagen rushed pell mell to Bornholm to claim the plane.

He didn't even get to see it. Heavily armed guards surrounded the jet until it was loaded on a ship and sent to Copenhagen under armed naval escort.

The Polish secretary, Mieczyslaw Lakomy, spoke darkly of "grave consequences" if the plane were not returned, but the Danes replied bluntly, not until they get a look at it.

Meanwhile, air experts from the West calmly stripped the highly touted fighter plane of its vaunted secrets.

Only last night, a Danish Foreign Office announcement said the examination of the MIG had reached "such an advanced stage that a final report is expected this week end."

Judd Hearing Move Vetoeed

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - An advisory jury in habeas corpus proceedings on the sanity of trunk murderer Winnie Ruth Judd has been refused.

Counsel for Mrs. Elizabeth Harvey, legal guardian of Mrs. Judd, asked the jury to decide on the "Tiger Woman's" sanity when a hearing begins here Wednesday. Judge Nicholas Udall rejected the request, ruling the court alone must decide the issues.

Mrs. Judd, who was condemned to death for the murder of two women friends in 1931, is seeking release from the Arizona State Hospital (Mental Institution), maintaining she is sane.

Last May Mrs. Judd's death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment but she was not released from the hospital. She has escaped from the hospital six times.

Supreme Soviet Sits in Council

MOSCOW (AP) - The 1,000 delegates of the Supreme Soviet—the Russian Parliament—meet tomorrow amid expectations they will okay the selection of Georgi Malenkov as prime minister succeeding the late Joseph Stalin.

The Soviet press announced last night that the first session of Parliament will open at 2 p.m. Russian time. The two houses—the Council of Union and the Council of Nationalities—will meet in joint session.

Delegates began arriving yesterday by rail and plane from the far reaches of the Soviet Union for what is the fourth session of the Supreme Soviet. It originally had been scheduled to convene today.

Flash Fire Rips Through Apartment

SALEM, Mass. - Officials today sought to determine the cause a three-story brick apartment building last night, taking the lives of four persons.

Four other persons, including a 3-year-old daughter of one of the victims, were injured in the blaze that caused damage estimated unofficially at \$15,000. The fire swept through the building so swiftly that the second and third floors were enveloped in flames before fire fighters arrived.

House Blast Control Appeal Wins Support

WASHINGTON (AP) - Proposals by Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) to exact standby economic controls have drawn a compliment from the CIO and qualified support from the Committee of Economic Development.

The sentiments were expressed yesterday at hearings by the Senate Banking Committee on two Capehart bills. One would set up a comprehensive system of controls, to be effective in an emergency. The other would authorize the President to freeze wages, prices and rents for 90 days in an emergency.

James B. Carey, CIO secretary-treasurer, commended Capehart for raising the question of standby controls and urged enactment of the comprehensive bill.

Fred Lazarus Jr. of Cincinnati, president of Federated Department Stores, Inc. and CED spokesman, talked in favor of the 90-day freeze, but with Congress, rather than the President, empowered to put it into effect.

Lester Collins, another UMW member who owned the house, testified he received \$300 from Tom Ramey, UMW international representative, for damages to the dwelling.

The UMW has been conducting a campaign to organize mines in Clay and Leslie Counties, the last non-union stronghold in the Eastern Kentucky coal field. The dynamiting of the house Dec. 4 was one in a series of violent incidents that have marked the drive.

Austrian Leader Dies At 83

VIENNA, Austria (AP) - Leopold Kunschak, president of the Austrian Parliament since the 1945 liberation of his country, died today in a Vienna hospital. He was 83.

An announcement said death was due to a lung illness and heart weakness.

A member of the Catholic Conservative People's party, Kunschak had been fondly called the Father of the Parliament. In 1946, he was made an honorary citizen of Vienna.

A saddler in early life, he entered politics as a young man after joining the Christian Socialist party, the forerunner of the People's party. He was a member of Parliament before World War I, when the Austrian empire was one of the powers of Europe.
