POTATO MARKET REPORT

March 12, 1953

At Portland the potato supply was moderate. The demand was fair and the market was dull.

At San Francisco there were too few brokers track sales of potatoes to establish a market or quote prices.

At Los Angeles the potato market was slightly stronger. Truckload and carlot sales of Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1A, ranged from 4.35 to 4.65 a 100 pound sack. Klamath Russets, U.S. No. 1A, brought 4.00 a 100 pound sack.

At Chicago today the supply of old potatoes was moderate. The supply of Russets and the best Red Ruscies was good. The market was firm to slightly stronger. Others were slow and dull. Track sales of Idaho Russets, U.S. No. 1A, 20 to 30 per cent 10 ounces and larger, ranged from 5.25 to 5.40 a 100 pound sack. Street sales of U.S. No. 1A and generally good quality Idaho Russets, ranged from 5.40 to 5.85 a 100 pound sack.

At the Yakima shipping point on Wednesday, March 11, the potato market was very slow and dull. Russets, Size A, washed, U.S. No. 1, brought 3.60 to 3.65 in a few sales.

At the Idaho Falls shipping point on Wednesday, March 11, potato offerings were rather light. Growers were holding for higher prices. There was good wire inquiry. There was good demand for best stock and the market was firm to slightly stronger. Other stock was slow. Russets, U.S. No. 1, washed, 25 to 35 per cent 10 ounces and larger, brought 3.90 to 4.10 a 100 pound sack. Most of the sales brought 4.00 to 4.10 a sack. Some sales were occasionally higher. Russets, 15 to 20 per cent 10 ounces and larger, washed, brought 3.80 to 3.95 a 100 pound sack. These quotations are F.O.B. the shipping point.

Potato track holdings at the 16 major cities of the nation today amounted to 919 cars of old potatoes and 91 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 1029 cars of old potatoes and 93 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago. Arrivals at the 16 major cities today amounted to 304 cars of old potatoes and 26 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 393 cars of old potatoes and 36 cars of new potatoes arriving one week ago. Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation yesterday amounted to 1075 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 332 cars. Idaho moved 271 cars, Oregon moved 47 cars, and Washington moved 14 cars.

FOREIGN NEWS BRIEFS

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Ministry of Interior's Ta Tuo News Agency Saturday said Russian ground and air forces conducted large-scale three-day maneuvers in the Dairen—Port Arthur area in Manchuria in mid-February.

It described the maneuvers as the biggest of their kind in that region since the end of World War II.

Kirk Facing Parole End

Joe Luther Kirk, 42-year-old Chiloquin Indian, is in the County Jail facing probable resumption of a life prison sentence imposed in March of 1941 after he was convicted here of murder.

He was picked up yesterday at Chiloquin as a parole violator, by Parole Officer Paul Morgan.

The State Board of Parole and Probation has before it a recommendation that Kirk's parole be revoked.

He was convicted by jury of second degree murder of the Nov. 19, 1940, slaying of another Indian, Leonard Monte John, at Bonanza, and on March 11, 1941, was sentenced to life imprisonment. He entered prison on March 12, 1941, 12 years to the day before his jailing for parole violation yesterday.

The conviction and sentence of Kirk were notable in two instances. First, it was the only murder conviction by a Circuit Court jury in Klamath County for a number of years, and second, the life sentence was the first imposed by Judge David R. Vandenberg, who in 1941 had just become judge of the 13th judicial district.

Kirk served over 11 years in the Oregon State Prison, and was paroled July 16, 1952.

Parole Officer Morgan said Kirk violated the terms of his parole by drinking, by going to California with a group of Indians in an illegally taken car, by passing worthless checks in California, and by getting involved in a petty theft at Redding which netted him a 10-day jail sentence for vagrancy.

New Phone Books Due

The 1953 phone directory for Klamath Falls and vicinity will be out Monday, and copies should be in the hands of all subscribers in this area by Tuesday night.

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Manager S. C. Bowie said 18,500 copies have been printed, and some 12,000 will be distributed initially. About 90 percent of the new green-covered books will be hand-delivered by a contracting firm, employing local people to do the job.

The rest will go out by mail. Although the alphabetical section of the phone book contains about the same number of pages as the current edition, the yellow classified section has grown by 28 pages.

That, Bowie points out, is a pretty fair measure of the business activity in the Klamath Falls area. As in the past, number changes and additions since the last directory was published make it advisable for telephone users to look up listings in the new book before making calls.

Also, Bowie said, customers should shake out the leaves of their old books before turning them in, to make sure no important papers or other articles are left between the pages.

The printing job of the new phone books used up some 12,350 pounds of paper and 150 pounds of ink.
