

# 2 Posthumous Oscars May Be Awarded This Week



**HOLLYWOOD** — Things you may not know about Academy Awards:  
 When the 1953 Oscars are handed out at the Pantages Theater Thursday night, two of them may go to film creators who have died. They are Gordon Hollingshead, short subjects producer, and Gile Steele, costume designer.  
 The first posthumous Oscar in Academy history was awarded Sidney Howard, who died before the great success of "Gone With the Wind." He wrote the screen play. The youngest nominee for an acting Oscar was Jackie Cooper. He was listed among the best actors for his role in "Skippy" in 1931.

Walt Disney is the top Oscar winner. He has drawn 13 of the statuettes for his short subjects, plus three special awards and one Irving Thalberg Award for consistent production.  
**UNREWARDED**  
 Many film historians consider Charlie Chaplin and Greta Garbo the screen's greatest artists. But neither has won an Oscar for acting.  
 Garbo was nominated three times — "Anna Christie," 1930; "Camille," 1937; "Ninotchka," 1939. Chaplin got the nod twice, for "The Circus," 1929, and "The Great Dictator," 1940.  
 Chaplin's only award was a special one for "versatility and genius in writing, acting, directing and producing 'The Circus.'"

John Barrymore was never even nominated for an Oscar. However, the rest of the Barrymores are represented. Lionel snagged the big prize in 1930 for "A Free Soul."

## Strike Stops Jet Engines

**CINCINNATI** — A second strike today hit the General Electric Company's plant at suburban Evendale, where one strike has already tied up production of a big share of the Air Force's jet engines for two days.  
 About 4,500 members of the CIO United Auto Workers struck early today and their pickets joined those of the AFL International Association of Machinists.  
 The auto workers actually had stayed off the job since 12:01 a. m. Saturday when the 1,200 machinists struck and posted pickets.  
 Negotiations went on feverishly with federal mediators until it was certain that the walkouts could not be headed off. Air Force and Defense Department officials had let it be known that they were "much concerned" over the strikes.

## Adlai Ready For 1956

**WASHINGTON** — Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell of the Democratic National Committee said today he thinks Adlai E. Stevenson will be seriously considered as the party's 1956 presidential nominee.  
 Asked about a recent assertion by Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) that there is a conspiracy to drive the South out of the party, Mitchell said on an NBC television show that actually there is a strong effort under way to unite all segments of the party.  
 "The Democratic party is not going to die," he said. "It's not going to be broken."

## Importance Of Water Told

 That was the statement of Lyle Watts, former chief of the U. S. Forest Service, in a talk to Rotary Club Friday noon at the Willard Hotel.  
 Watts was with the Forest Service for 40 years and was chief forester from 1943 until June of last year. At present he makes his home in Portland, and shortly after retirement from the service became secretary of the Oregon Division of the Isaak Walton League.  
 Watts said he became actively associated with the Isaak Walton League, not because he likes to fish, but because of his interest in the conservation of all of our renewable resources, as exemplified in the league's slogan, "Defenders of the soil, woods, water and wildlife."  
 He stated that selective logging of our forests and intelligent grazing of forest and range lands not only will reap a continuing harvest of our natural resources but will improve water storage and help control flooding and erosion.  
 Water and power from water are the keys to development of the country, he said.

## Pilot Losses Worry Chief

**WASHINGTON** — Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg said last night he is "fed up with our boys being used as clay pigeons" by Communist plane pilots in Europe.  
 "I'm worried about it," said Vandenberg, the Air Force chief of staff, in speaking of the situation which saw two planes, one U. S. and one British, shot down by the Reds in Germany last week.  
 He said in talking with newsmen on his return from an inspection trip to Europe and Africa, that he could not comment further.  
 Vandenberg said U. S. pilots in the American zone of Germany must fly near the borders of Communist East Germany and Czechoslovakia "to see what is going on, but they stay well within our own lines."

## Adlai Briefed By Pres. Rhee

**SEOUL** — Adlai Stevenson received an up-to-the-minute picture of the fighting in Korea from top Allied ground and air commanders today after seeing South Korean President Syngman Rhee.  
 Rhee told Stevenson the Chinese Communist Army in Korea is tired and that a major Allied offensive could break the prolonged stalemate.  
 Stevenson called on Rhee immediately after his arrival by air from Pusan. On the way from the airfield to the presidential mansion, he received a rousing welcome from thousands of cheering, flag-waving Koreans, most of them school children.  
 Large banners strung across Seoul's main avenues read "Drive Away Chinese Reds," "Advance North for Unification of Korea" and "Strengthen ROK Forces."  
 These were the same banners that flew during the three-day visit of Gen. Eisenhower last December. Stevenson also was greeted with new banners reading: "Welcome Honorable Adlai Stevenson to Korea," and "We Regard Mr. Adlai Stevenson Forever as our Friend."

## Red Officials Said Executed

**TAIPEI** — The Chinese Nationalist Ministry of Interior's Ta Tao News Agency today said a small band of guerrillas raided a Communist co-operative 10 miles southwest of Canton Feb. 28 and seized and executed four Red officials of both sexes.  
 The agency said the guerrillas made a bonfire of Russian-made clothing, Chinese Communist banners and the portrait of Red China's leader, Mao Tse-tung. Then they posted anti-Communist placards and distributed anti-Communist leaflets.  
 Five Communist militiamen, it said, defected to the guerrillas.
