Probe Snub Penalized

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sydney Buchman, former Hollywood writer-producer, was fined \$150 Monday and given a one year suspended sentence for snubbing a House Un-American Activities Committee subpoena.

He could have been jailed for a year and given a \$1,000 fine.

Once one of the nation's leading producers and writers of Hollywood films, Buchman has been out of the motion picture scene since he became involved in the House Committee's probe for Communist influences in Hollywood.

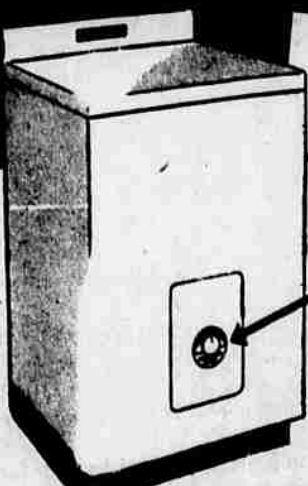
Buchman, an admitted former Communist, was convicted of contempt of Congress last Thursday by a U. S. district court jury.

The 51-year-old Buchman told the court Monday that he "acted in good faith" and meant no contempt in his heart when he failed to show up for Committee questioning Jan. 28, 1952.

Instead of appearing, he went to court in an unsuccessful effort to kill the subpoena.



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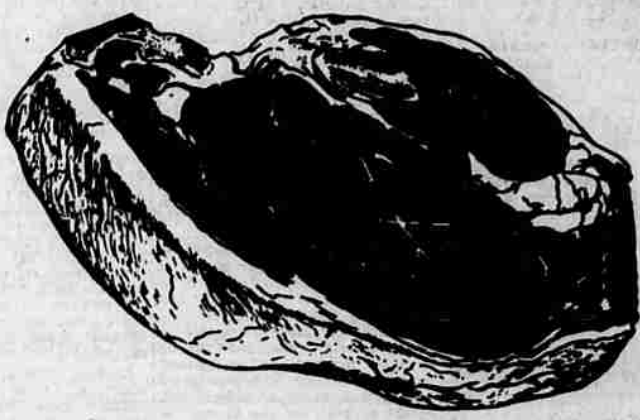
