Chicago (W) — A suspicion of recurrence of vesicular exanthema ruled outside order buyers out of the hog market at the stockyards Tuesday and prices fell 40 to 75 cents a hundred pounds as a result.	
Cattle were steady to 25 cents lower, the decline going at times to cows and bulls. Vealers were steady to 10 cent lower and trade was not set up in sheep.	
Most decline on hogs appeared on the cream of the run which normally goes to shippers. Most butcher weights sold from \$21.00 to \$21.40, the practical top. Sows brought \$17.50 to \$19.50.	
Most good and prime steers and yearlings sold from \$21.00 to \$27.25 and good and choice heifers from \$20.00 to \$23.50. A few choice and prime mixed yearlings moved at \$24.00 and \$24.25.

Cons Saw Way Out Of Cells

SALEM (W) — Three convicts sawed their way out of the segregation unit of the state penitentiary at 2 a.m. Tuesday, but they were caught a few minutes later.

Warden Virgil O'Malley said they forced their cell doors open, and cut three bars in a window by using emery dust on a piece of string.

Guard Edward Thornton heard them outside between two cell blocks, and he and guard Capt. Emil Sunberg captured them.

Note of the three men had been involved in previous escape attempts.

They are:

Lawrence Ogilvie, 37, serving consecutive sentences of life, 10 years and one year for first degree murder, assault and arson. He is from Multnomah County.

Raymond Knight, 19, Marion County, doing 10 years for assault and robbery.

Guy Earl, 25, Lane County, serving 10 years for armed robbery.

Better Look Gift Cow In Mouth

CHICAGO (W) — Don't judge a cow's age by her teeth.

That's the advice of the American Veterinary Medical Association which claimed Tuesday that the generally accepted "dental timetable" for cattle is misleading.

This timetable, prepared by early animal anatomists for text books, has pairs of incisor teeth erupting at two, three, four and five years of age.

That may have been correct many years ago for slow developing breeds, the AVMA Journal said, "but fairly extensive observations recently indicate the interval for eruption may average less than nine months."

Medford People See A-Flash

MEDFORD (W) — Residents of this area, about 600 airline miles from Yucca Flat, reported seeing the flash of the A-bomb Tuesday morning.

From residents west, southwest and north of the city, as well as in town, came reports that the sky to the southeast was lighted by a rose-colored glow at the time radio broadcasts were announcing the explosion had taken place. The glow apparently lasted about two seconds.

Fossil To Be Carefully Studied

NEWPORT, Ore. (W) — An expert on fossils is expected here this week to study what apparently is the fossil of an animal skull, 24 inches long, 19 inches wide and 16 inches high.

Mrs. Florence Smith, Agate Beach, former Lincoln County school teacher, said she found it north of Spencer Creek, where the ocean has been washing away sand recently. The skull is embedded in a piece of sandstone rock, estimated to weigh 80 pounds.

Japs To Carry On Business As Usual

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TOKYO (W) — Japan's foreign minister, Katsuo Okazaki, said carry on "business as usual" except for high policy level decisions until the national elections next month.

Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida this week dissolved Parliament after it passed a non-confidence motion against him. The elections are scheduled April 19.

Huge Parade Set For Fifth Avenue

Some 30 passengers were astonished as Hazelton, a driver for the Detroit Street Railway System for two months, grabbed his jacket and disappeared. He turned up later back at the bus terminal.

"I'm sick of people," he said, "I quit."
