Bloodmobile Visits Lodge

The lodge room of the Elks Temple has been converted into a hospital-like room to receive blood donors in the Klamath County Red Cross bloodmobile program, here today and tomorrow.

Donors started registering at 12:30 p.m. today in the lobby of the Temple. More donors can be accommodated between 2 and 4 p.m. An additional hour has been allotted this afternoon, continuing the program from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m. to permit office workers and others to contribute who are unable to reach headquarters earlier.

Hours for Wednesday are 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and additional donors can be handled. The truck goes to Bly Thursday, March 19 and the program will be carried out in the high school gymnasium.

Accommodations have been arranged in the Temple to process 400 donors and additional nurses have arrived to speed up the work. The quota for the county is 696 pints of blood.

Parking space has been arranged in both lots adjacent to the Temple and parking meters in the immediate vicinity will be covered for the use of donors.

The canteen will be open in the Pine Room of the building.

City Swim Program To Be Kicked Off Here Soon

A city recreation directed swim program will get under way here the last of March with class instruction to be given in two divisions, for life saving and water safety in the first group and for water safety instructor's certification.

The program, being sponsored jointly by Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and the YMCA is open to all interested persons.

Junior and senior life saving classes are to be held nightly, 7:30 to 10 p.m. in the KUHHS natatorium starting March 22. Instruction will continue through the 31st. Dates for the water safety instructor's classes are April 1-2-3.

Junior and senior life saving instructions will be given nightly, 7:30 to 10 p.m. Junior candidates for life saving must be 12 to 15 years old and able to swim 100 yards in good form. Senior life savers must be 16 years or older and have the same swim requirements.

Prospective water safety instructors will be given the highest certificate given to a layman by the

Red Cross on completion of requirements. Eligibility includes a current senior life saving card, interest in teaching life saving and water safety and the applicant must be 19-years-old or older. Satisfactory completion of the swim course entitles the certificate holder to teach water safety.

Following close of the life saving and water safety swim programs, a learn to swim campaign will get under way, starting April 6, also at the natatorium. The 8-weeks schedule of classes will cost \$1.

Registration for any of the classes may be made at the YMCA or the city recreation department by phone or mail.
