Negroes Back On Mat Show

Frankie Stojack, the polticking puncher from Tacoma, returns to the Army Wednesday night against Negro Frank James, the Baltimore Cannonball.

Prep Cagefest Opens Tonight

Cleveland Honkers' First Foe

EUGENE (AP) — Oregon's biggest high school sports event, the Class A basketball tournament, opens here Tuesday night.

Sixteen teams, winners in districts throughout the state, will compete in the five-day tourney.

A new champion will be named next Saturday night. The defending champion, Lincoln High of Portland, did not earn a tournament berth this year.

Marshallfield and Clatskanie meet in the opening game at 7:30 p.m. Two Portland teams, Roosevelt and Central Catholic, clash in the nightcap.

Wednesday games open at 9 a.m. with The Dalles of District 2, undefeated in 24 starts this season, meeting Ontario of District 1.

Other first round games Wednesday: Albany, District 7 vs. Medford, District 4; Hillsboro, District 9 vs. Salem, District 11; Eugene District 6 vs. Milwaukie District 12; Lakeview, District 3 vs. Cleveland of Portland, District 15, and Dallas, District 8 vs. Astoria, District 10.

The Dalles and Marshallfield are rated as the teams to beat. But strong competition is expected from Medford, Eugene, Hillsboro and Cleveland.

The Dalles Ends High

By The Associated Press Underated The Dalles goes into the Class A high school basketball tournament at Eugene this week as the favorite of Oregon sports writers, though not without disputes from Marshallfield and Eugene.

The final Associated Press poll of the season established The Dalles as the No. 1 team in the state with seven votes for first place from the sports writers and sportscasters.

Six of the writers did not agree, though. Three of them voted for Marshallfield as the No. 1 team, and the other three voted for Eugene.

On total points, though, The Dalles amassed 123 to take the top spot. Marshallfield was No. 2 with 110 and Eugene No. 3 with 103.

Medford, which was a notch ahead of Eugene last week, dropped to No. 4. Following in order came Cleveland of Portland, Hillsboro, Albany, Salem, Central Catholic and Roosevelt of Portland.

All these teams have qualified for the tournament, which opens Tuesday night.

Dropping from the top 10 were Gresham and Jefferson of Portland, both of them eliminated in district playoffs last week. Also dropping from the top 10 was Clatskanie, which was tied for tenth place last week. Clatskanie, however, will be a competitor at the tourney.

The Dalles will go into the tournament with the best class A record in the state—24 consecutive victories. Marshallfield, the No. 2 team, has a 25-2 record, Eugene, 20-5 and Medford 21-3.

In the poll 10 points were awarded for a first-place vote, nine points for a second-place vote, etc.

Of the teams not making the top 10, but qualified for the tournament, Clatskanie drew the most backing, getting 12 points. Milwaukie got 9, Ontario 6, Astoria 2 and Lakeview 1.

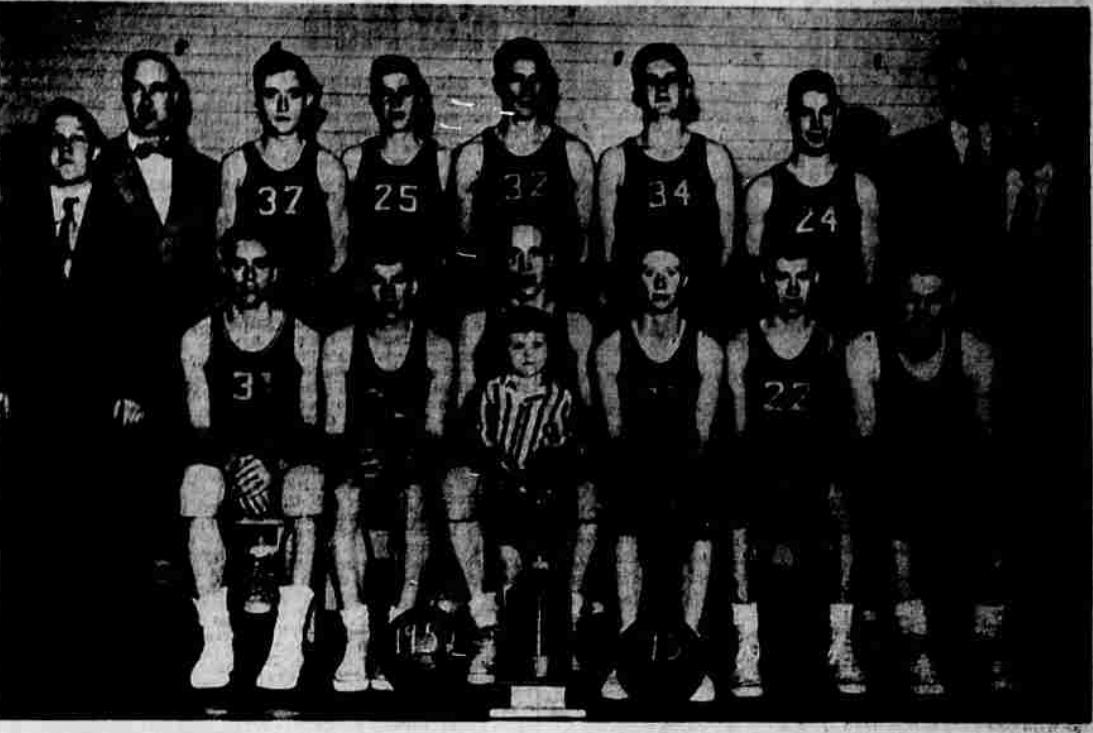

Baseball Move Vetoed

Indians, Chisox Only Clubs Behind Veeck

By JACK HAND and JOE REICHLER TAMPA, Fla. — One of the surest things in the history of baseball boomeranged into one of the biggest surprises in the game since the turn of the century when Bill Veeck was refused permission to transfer the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore.

For almost a week, unofficial polls of the owners indicated that the proposed switch, but when they met here yesterday, they sent Veeck back to St. Louis for at least one more year by astounding one and all with a 5-2 vote against the switch. Only the Cleveland Indians and the Chicago White Sox reportedly sided with Veeck.

As officials talked it over today, they were not so certain the Boston Braves would receive permission to transfer the National League franchise to Milwaukee. This move also had been thought to be all set except for the official voting in St. Petersburg tomorrow.

All the National League club owners must approve if the switch is to be made, and at least one—Walter O'Malley of the Brooklyn Dodgers—hinted he might not vote for the change.

Against Although he was not available, it was reported that Horace Stoneham of the New York Giants was against the move.

Another thing that might influence the action of the National League moguls was the attitude of Commissioner Ford Frick. He obviously was pleased that the Browns will be forced to remain in St. Louis.

"I'm in favor of transferring the franchise, but not at this late time," he said, referring to the Browns. "It would have been nonsensical to make the move so close to the start of the season. We would have been up to our necks in lawsuits."

LOSES MONEY Veeck, who said he lost \$400,000 in St. Louis last year, was disappointed at the turn of events. "None of the other owners would be a bit unhappy if I sold out," he said.

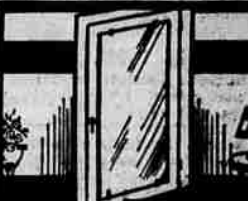
