and Miss Booth are the heavy favorites. The pair has won more honors in the pre-Academy Awards circuit than any other duo in recent years. Usually the awards are scattered among a number of contenders.

So far, the Broadway actress has been honored six times for her performance as the housewife in "Come Back, Little Sheba." She was cited by the Associated Press Daily poll, the National Board of Review, New York Film Critics, Look magazine and the Hollywood Foreign Correspondents Association. No other film actress has received more than one award this year.

Cooper, the resolute law enforcer of "High Noon," walked off with five citations. His came from the AP and Film Daily polls, Photoplay magazine, Look and the Hollywood foreign correspondents.

Closest contender is Ralph Richardson ("Breaking the Sound Barrier"). He won three awards—National Board of Review, New York critics and the British Film Academy. But he isn't nominated for an Oscar this year.

Tomorrow night's event will be the most elaborate in the 23-year history of the Motion Picture Academy. That's because the academy got caught with its finances down. Three studios withdrew financial support, and the academy sent out an RCA for a TV-radio sponsor.

SOA-Victor answered the call, plunking down \$100,000 for the rights. It has been estimated that the bill will come to \$250,000 when the charges for TV and radio time, exploitation, etc., are added up.

This year the academy was faced with an alarming fact—few of the top contenders would be on hand for the awards presentations at the Pantages Theatre.

Among the top actress nominees, Miss Booth is in a New York play, Bette Davis ("The Star") has undergone surgery following the closing of her Broadway show, Julie Harris ("Member of the Wedding") has been touring with a play, but is expected to be in New York. Susan Hayward ("With a Song in My Heart") took off for a European vacation.

Only Joan Crawford ("Sudden Fear") is expected to attend the Hollywood-and-Vine festivities.

Of the male contenders, Cooper is making a film in Mexico, and Kirk Douglas ("The Bad and the Beautiful") is filming in France. Alec Guinness ("The Lavender Hill Mob") is in his native England, and Jose Ferrer ("Moulin Rouge") has been overreaching his theatrical ventures in New York.

Marlon Brando ("Viva Zapata!") is the sole male star nominee making a picture in Hollywood. He hates formal events and says he won't attend.

Because of this situation, the academy has arranged for the awards to be presented in two locations for the first time in history. The main program will take place at the Pantages, with Bob Hope acting as emcee.

A group of nominees and former winners will also gather at NBC's International Theater in New York. Conrad Nagel, a former president of the academy, will emcee the eastern portion of the show. If any winners are in New York, they will receive their Oscars from Frederic March, a two-time winner himself.

Highlight of the entertainment will be the singing of nominations for the best song. The performers will be: Bob Hope and Marilyn Maxwell, "Am I in Love?"; Bill Daniels, "Because You're Mine"; Tex Ritter, "High Noon" ballad; Celeste Holm, "Thumbelina"; and Johnny Mercer and Peggy Lee, "Zing a Little Zong."

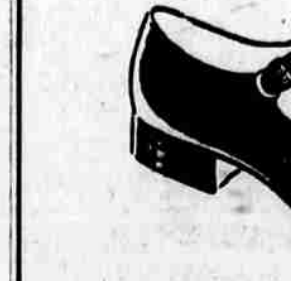
### PERSECUTION
