Ag Bureau Reshuffled

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department has undergone some major shifts in its organizational setup under the new Republican administration, and its total employment has increased slightly.

A personnel report showed Wednesday that the department's total paid employment at the end of February was 66,848, an increase of 50 over Jan. 31. The number of full-time workers dropped from 55,465 to 55,381 during the month, but part-time employees went up from 11,383 to 11,467.

In one of his first acts after taking office Jan. 21, Secretary of Agriculture Benson announced plans to overhaul the department with the idea of "streamlining its services in the interest of economy and greater efficiency."

In a formal statement, he described the department as an agency which had been "swollen into a huge bureaucracy."

The new secretary emphasized, however, that it would take time to effect savings.

A reorganization plan for the department, scheduled to be submitted to Congress this week, may provide ways for reducing personnel and some other expenses.

Prisoners Cut Way Out Of Jail

McMINNVILLE (AP)—Four Yamhill County jail prisoners chipped their way through a brick wall to freedom Tuesday night. Twenty other prisoners could have followed but chose to remain in the unopened jail.

The escapees used can lids and a screwdriver to make a hole in the one-brick-thick wall. They then broke into the sheriff's office in the same building, helped themselves to other prisoners' clothing, and left by a window.

On the floor above, a school meeting was in progress. Those attending said they heard noises but had not taken the trouble to investigate.

The four were identified as: James Robert Brady, 26, Donald Van Lannen, 18, and Samuel Owen Barnett, 20, all accused of forgery, and Kenneth Norman Beaver, 17, accused of disorderly conduct.

Bill Would Lift Indian Spending

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Interior Committee Tuesday approved a bill which would eliminate money spending restrictions now imposed on the Klamath Indian Tribe.

The bill would remove a \$15,000 ceiling on annual spending for salaries and expenses of tribal officials. It would permit the Tribal General Council to set up fixed pay schedules, approved by the secretary of the interior.

Teachers Make Bid For TV

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Education Association, holding its annual meeting here, Tuesday urged the Legislature to reverse itself and approve a state-owned educational television station for Oregon.

This action came on a motion to tell the board of trustees to send such a resolution to the Legislature.

The delegates heard Stuart Chase, author and economist, tell of the causes of conflict. He said such study is into one of the neglected fields of knowledge.
