Bavaria Says No On Exhibit
 MUNICH, Germany (AP) — Bavaria's State Parliament has voted not to send a valuable collection of 83 great oil paintings to the United States for exhibit. The Bavarians are afraid they won't get them back, or that they might be damaged.

The pictures, from the Bavarian Art Gallery, were to be shown in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Washington.

The West German Foreign Office at Bonn said earlier the property of Bavaria State is not protected by law from confiscation

New Business Heads Named

FORT KLAMATH—At a meeting of the Fort Klamath Business Association March 12, for the fourth consecutive year Mrs. Harold L. (Myrtle) Wimer was chosen to head the organization as secretary-manager, and the following Advisory Board members were also elected to serve for the ensuing year: Guss A. Page, Carl Wilson, J. Quincy Bueh and Clay Thomas.

A busy session was spent by members of the group, who prepared for mailing over 4000 folders advertising Crater Lake and the Wood River valley, 1800 having already been mailed early this month by the secretary-manager.

This is the first large consignment of these brochures to be sent out this year, and 15,000 additional copies are on current order from V. M. Caley's Klamath Printing Company, Klamath Falls; of this amount, each member of the association will receive 500 for personal distribution to the traveling public, while the remainder will be sent out, the mailing list including chambers of commerce, automobile clubs, etc., throughout the United States as well as parts of Canada. The advertising project was started five years ago by Fort Klamath business people working in cooperation with personnel of the Crater Lake National Park service.

New members this year are Mr. and Mrs. Norman Van Iderstine, formerly of Stockton, recent purchasers of the Wood River Auto Court here; and George Loosley, who with his wife and infant son George Allen moved here two months ago to make his home. He is affiliated with his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth M. Loosley, in management of Loosley's General Merchandise store here. Loosley told the group of an interesting happening in Los Angeles prior to his coming to Fort Klamath. On a television program, a young couple was planning winter and summer vacation trips in their new car, and for the former chose Sun Valley in Idaho, the program showing advertising literature on the famous winter resort; for the summer vacation, a trip to Crater Lake was planned, and one of the local Business Association's Crater Lake Wood River valley folders was used to illustrate an ideal summer vacation trip to Crater Lake. Loosley stated that the pamphlet was televised so closely by the camera that the colored picture of Crater Lake as well as imprinted words were very clear and legible, and estimated that the television travel feature was seen by at least 3 million people—very gratifying news indeed to the local association which sponsors the advertising literature.

Plans were made for a Red Cross benefit affair which the association will sponsor in the clubhouse March 28, when an old fashioned box social will be held, with

West German Chancellor Battles for Treaties To Bring Area in With Allies

BONN, Germany (AP)—West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer battled today for lower house ratification of twin treaties to bring his almost nation into armed alliance with the West. The 71-year old government chief wants this step completed before he goes to the United States for a state visit April 6.

The treaties are the Allied Bonn Peace Contract giving West Germany near sovereignty, and the six-nation European Defense Community pact, setting up a unified West European army. Germany would contribute 500,000 men to the one uniform force.

As the two agreements came up in the lower house (Bundestag) for their third and final reading, the confident Adenauer called for a big majority "to show the way" to the rest of free Europe. The final vote was expected tonight after extended debate and lengthy opposition from Socialist opponents.

The anti-rearmament Socialists have announced plans for a last ditch fight against ratification, but many members of the opposition conceded privately they had little hope of blocking lower house approval. Adenauer beat them by 50 votes on the second reading last December.

Approval of the treaties — a major step in Adenauer's efforts to lead West Germany into a unified Europe — would give the Chancellor added prestige during his

Washington talks next month with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles.

Despite American prodding, the six-nation army treaty, signed in Paris last May, has met with repeated delays in all the countries. In France, its prospects look especially dim.
