City Studies Mills Sewers

Mayor Paul Landry says the city has not pigeonholed the idea of doing something about the bad sanitary sewer condition in Mills Addition and some adjacent areas.

In January, City Engineer Taxi Thomas told the City Council the Mills' sewer situation was so bad it merited immediate attention. Thomas said the lines were so overtaxed at that particular time that in one instance raw sewage was gushing from a manhole.

On motion of Councilman Frank Tarr, the council instructed Thomas to obtain bids from engineering firms for a survey of the area and recommendations.

Several weeks ago, Thomas handed the council bids from two firms. No action has been taken since. Yesterday, the mayor said the council had merely been too busy to get at the matter.

The two bids: J. W. Cunningham and Associates, Portland, \$1,400; Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merrifield, Corvallis, \$2,005.

The area to be inspected is everything east of the S.P. tracks to the city limits between the canal and S. 6th, plus a small Hot Springs area near Hillside Hospital and a few auxiliary disposal facilities.
