Actress Says No To Vice

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Former actress Dorothy Cominsore has pleaded innocent and asked for a jury trial on charges of prostitution.

Miss Cominsore, 40, was arrested by sheriff's vice squad officers yesterday. They said they picked her up at a bar and that she suggested: "Let's find a dark place to go."

The actress, who co-starred 13 years ago with Orson Welles in "Citizen Kane," commented: "Even if I had left my head at home I wouldn't have said a thing like that. This is all a part of my being an 'unfriendly witness.'"

Miss Cominsore lost a bitter child custody battle last November with her ex-husband, film writer Richard Collins. She declined at that time to say whether she was a member of the Communist party, saying she is "a loyal American."

Collins had renounced communism two years before and appeared as a friendly witness before the House Un-American Activities Committee. Last Oct. 6, Miss Cominsore appeared before that committee in Los Angeles and refused to answer questions about party affiliations.

NEW YORK (AP) - The Internal Revenue Bureau says crooner Frank Sinatra owes \$109,907 in back taxes.

The bureau slapped a lien against Sinatra yesterday, citing an alleged unpaid balance for 1951 of \$98,510, plus \$11,487 disallowed for the filing years 1948 through 1948.

A lien permits the government to seize assets up to the amount named in the order.

Two Fliers Killed In Jet Crash

GAINSBOROUGH, England (AP) - Two British airmen died last night in the crash of a speedy Canberra jet bomber, returning from a mock war raid over West Germany. It was the first fatality in four days of the Exercise Jungle King - the biggest air maneuvers of its kind since World War II.

The two-engine bomber plunged to the ground and exploded just three miles short of its home base here. Another Canberra set a record last fall by flying across the Atlantic and back in one day.

Greatest Show On Earth Wins First DeMille Oscar

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - A happy Hollywood rejoiced today in honoring one of its founding fathers - Cecil B. DeMille whose "Greatest Show on Earth" became his first Oscar winner in 40 years of epic making. It was one of the few times Hol-

lywood has honored one of its greats while he was still around to enjoy it.

The movie pioneer, now 72, was the big star of the silver jubilee Academy Awards last night. A film colony audience cheered wildly in the RKO Pantages Theater as millions more for the first time saw the ceremony via television.

DeMille's win for "Greatest Show" as the best picture of 1952 was the night's only surprise. Favorites Shirley Booth and Gary Cooper came through as predicted to take the best actress and best actor awards.

DeMille, whose 70 pictures previously had won him only millions at the boxoffice, admitted he was most surprised.

"I thought 'The Quiet Man' or 'High Noon' would get it," the proud showman told reporters. He also took home the Irving Thalberg special Oscar for distinguished production.

He was happier for his daughter, Katherine DeMille, who became the first person to win a father and husband win Oscars on the same night.

She is the wife of Anthony Quinn, whose earthy portrayal of a Mexican revolutionary in "Viva Zapata!" won in the best supporting actor class.

Gloria Grahame, also a favorite, was voted best supporting actress for her job as the flighty southern belle of "The Bad and the Beautiful."

Another veteran, John Ford, won the directing award for "The Quiet Man."

Although "Greatest Show" was a surprise - "High Noon" was the favorite - it's win was not wholly unexpected. Many knew that Hollywood has never quite forgiven itself for letting D. W. Griffith go to his grave unhonored by the
