DUNSMUIR, Calif. (AP) — Sportsman L. D. (Babe) Taylor returned from British Columbia Friday with stories about a most unusual hunt... for 700 black bears. The bearskins are needed to make 3,000 shakos for the royal guards to wear at the June coronation of Queen Elizabeth in London.

Taylor, a member of the Hungry Hunters Club here, said he quit after only two days. "It wasn't a hungry hunt, but a massacre, he said, explaining: "There were just too many bears up there to make it sporting."

Livestock

CHICAGO (AP) — Hogs were quoted nominally steady Saturday at the end of a week in which a sharp drop in shipper demand brought about a decline in prices. Losses for the week ranged from 25 to 75 cents after a seven month peak at \$22.10 was reached Monday. Lighter weight hogs showed the most decline because of the lack of shipper demand, usually concentrated on these offerings. Shipments were the smallest in four years. Receipts were 30 per cent smaller than in the same 1952 week. Wholesale pork showed a little strength.

In the cattle section slaughter steers and heifers closed mostly 50 cents higher. Receipts of all classes of cattle were more than 50 per cent greater than in the like week last year. Cows held steady, but bulls and vealers declined. Stockers and feeders gained \$1.00.

Slaughter lamb prices advanced for the week. Eastern shipping interests became aggressive buyers at the close. Sheep declined.
