



WALL STREET
NEW YORK (U) — Gradually spreading weakness sent the stock market lower Monday with air-crafts a focal point of the decline. Losses ran to around 2 points in the case of some aircrafts while in the remainder of the list the fall extended to between 1 and 2 points at the outside. Gains were modest and scattered.

The retreat uncovered enough selling to send volume to an estimated two million shares. That compares with 1,730,000 shares traded Friday when the market was easing a little lower.

Aircrafts were down from the very first.

Orland Moore, 34, said his wife was trying to build a fire in a wood stove and threw in some lubricating oil, which caused an explosion.

With flames racing through the frame cabin, Moore ran into a bedroom and wrapped blankets around the children, Olean, 12, Joyce, 6, and Aca Bell, 2. Olean ran outside while Moore carried the two younger children to safety.

The cabin was destroyed. Moore is recovering in a hospital here from deep burns on his left hand, right leg and face. Mrs. Moore and the children, who escaped injury, are staying with neighbors.

Tulelake Plays Host To Siskiyou County Hi School Bands; Six Units In Show

DORRIS — Despite the raw wind, six high school bands of Siskiyou County marched in gala style at Tulelake, Wednesday, March 18, when Tulelake High School was host for the annual music festival.

Leading the parade was Etna in their attractive red and white uniforms, followed by Fort Jones in blue and red. The Yreka band was outstanding in its size, colorful red and gold uniforms and snappings. They were followed by Butte Valley's 30-piece band in their shiny new maroon and gold Eisenhower suits. Mount Shasta in blue, gold and white, and Tulelake in blue and white ended the showy display. Majorettes of the various bands also drew applause from on-lookers. The parade was a noon interlude between the morning session of chorus numbers and an afternoon of band playing.

The other three school bands taking part in the festival were Dunsmuir, in black, orange and white uniforms; McCloud, purple, gold and white; Weed, tan and green.

Two-Gun Turnkey Kills 3, Stops Seven Fleeing Cons

FT. WORTH, Tex. (U) — A 37-year-old turnkey fired two pistols into a band of seven escaping prisoners yesterday, killing three and wounding another.

Chief Turnkey W. P. Foster thereby stopped the second attempted break in a little more than a month from the Tarrant County Jail.

Three others in the mob that rushed the jail's office yesterday morning fled back into the jail and were beaten into submission by a Negro trustee.

Ten prisoners fled here Feb. 18. One of them, Floyd Hill, Alcatraz parole violator charged in a \$250,000 robbery, remains at large.

Three of those in yesterday's attempt had been recaptured after the February break.

Killed instantly was Bobby Dean Baker, 18, indicted for armed robbery. A moment before his violent end, Baker told his followers: "We're going for blood and death."

Lloyd D. Lasher, 17, held on car theft charges, also died. He had been Baker's confederate in the earlier break.

William Howard Ford, 20, jailed for car theft, also was fatally wounded.

Other slugs hit C. L. Eubanks, 18, held on burglary charges, in the mouth and right arm.

Foster had a flesh wound in the left thigh when a gun discharged as Eubanks and another officer fought for the weapon.

The attempted break began about 9 a.m. when jail guard Jess Miles went to the fifth floor of the jail for Ford and Eubanks. They said they wanted haircuts before regular Sunday morning church services. The pair overpowered Miles and freed the other five with his keys.

They were armed with a length of chain, two knives, a club and a sharp-edged spoon, but had no guns.

As they rushed the jail's office in the basement they found Foster and two deputies talking. Foster emptied his 38-caliber pistol. He grabbed another officer's 44 and fired it "several times."

Baker crashed to the floor dead. Ford fell at the base of the last.
