## Youthful Face Sends Lon Off To South America

child actors, the awkward age comes when they try to bridge the gap between playing kiddies and grownups. The transition came later for Lon, whose youthful face has typed him as a teen-ager. This despite the fact that he hasn't been one for 10 years.

## Queen Mary Said Worse

**LONDON (AP) —** Queen Mary's condition has become "more grave," a medical bulletin announced Tuesday afternoon. The bulletin, posted at the gates of the 85-year-old Queen grandmother's residence, said:

It was the second bulletin of the day on the condition of the grandmother Queen, who took a turn for the worse Tuesday after being stricken a month ago with what doctors said was a recurrence of a gastric ailment.

Her granddaughter, Queen Elizabeth II, and other members of the royal family were quickly informed of the developments. The Duke of Edinburgh arrived by plane from a week's tour of Germany, and hurried to Buckingham Palace.

Crowds gathered about Marlborough House, the aged Queen's residence near Buckingham Palace.

Queen Mary has been confined to bed for more than a month by what doctors described as a recurrence of an old gastric ailment. One London medical authority said the bulletin on the Queen's condition means she is "not quite holding her own."

"It's no small issue with him. He frankly confesses that he couldn't get a picture job last year. I asked him why."

"For one thing, producers don't seem to be making the kind of picture I have done," he replied. "They don't go in for animal pictures. The other reason is my face. They can't think of me as anything but a kid."

Most men fret about their receding hairlines. Not Lon. He proudly points to the thinning locks at his temples.

"I was hoping they'd help me get more growthy robes," he sighed. "But when I did a Korean War picture at Columbia, they passed on a couple of hairpieces, and I played a kid of 19."

Although he didn't work during 1952, Lon didn't suffer financially. He is one of those rare actors who save their money. "I lived off income from property I had bought when I was making good money," he remarked. "I didn't mind being called a lightward in those days."

But the year's inactivity caused him to reassess his career. He now says he'll give it two years to blossom out into something permanent. If things don't pan out, he'll turn to something more reliable. Last year he studied real estate, which is his father's business. He likes it, and even studied and got a license to become a real estate broker.

But he hasn't given up on Hollywood yet. Right now he's embarking on an adventure which he hopes will give him production experience as well as commercial success.

He takes off next Sunday for South America. He plans to tour the continent for five months, shooting travelogues to be shown on TV or on the lecture circuit. This is no flighty venture, Lon has spent many hours in the Hollywood library doing research and at the Wilshire Ebell Theater, local showcase of the travelogue merchants.

"It's a funny thing about Hollywood," said Lon. "I sat around for a year without a job. But when I set a March 29 deadline for leaving, I got several offers."

Among these have been two TV films and a war picture, "Combat!" He was delighted with the latter, because he was allowed to play the oldest age he has been on the screen—26.

## Russians Claim Giant Peaches Now

**LONDON (AP) —** The Russians, who aspire to surpass all things American, claimed Monday they have stolen a march on California in the apricot and peach development.

Moscow Radio said a Soviet fruit station in Samarkand, Central Asia, "has evolved nine different types of apricots and 11 types of peaches which by their taste, quality and size are a considerable improvement on the California fruit."

The broadcast said one variety of peach, known as the Farhad, weighs up to 420 grams—nearly 15 ounces.

It added that the old Samarkand custom of lining the highways with fruit trees has been revived by planting 20,000 apricot trees along the country roads.

## Actress To Aid Ex-Husband

**NEW YORK (AP) —** Actress Diana Barrymore voluntarily went to the Federal Building yesterday to discuss the Mann Act case against her former husband, John R. Howard.

The defendant, a 33-year-old tennis professional, is accused of transporting a woman from California to New York for immoral purposes in 1949. His case is on call but may be postponed.

Miss Barrymore told reporters she knew nothing about Howard's case but had been asked to call on the U. S. attorney's office about it.

## FSA Proposal Speeding On

**WASHINGTON (AP) —** The administration plan to elevate the Federal Security Agency to a Cabinet rank department continues its swift course through Congress.

The Senate Government Operations Committee approved it yesterday in the form in which the House passed it last week. In so doing, the committee went beyond the report of its own subcommittee, which had approved the plan but had taken no action on special provision to make it effective in 1953 instead of 60 days. The measure now goes to the Senate.

Final committee approval was unanimous, but one vote was cast against the 10-day provision—that of Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), who said he thought the speedup would "set a bad precedent."
