

Jews Backwash on Waterfront

WARD — A Jewish man, 36, was shot in the chest by a Communist mine field on the waterfront in the biggest attack in five months. He was assigned to take a hill near Baldy to back up a counterattack.

"I don't know whether it was a Communist mine field or whether it was ours," the lieutenant said. "I went first and told my men to follow me. We hadn't gone far when one of my runners stepped on a mine. It killed him and injured my radio man. I was wounded in the neck but decided to keep on."

"We got no fire from the hill we were taking and it turned out no Chinese were on top of it."

"But my men were blowing themselves up on the land mines. Finally one of the men in the platoon who was right back of me stepped on a mine. I don't know if it killed him, but the explosion got me in the back and arm and put me out of commission. I lay there for awhile and finally a medic took me back to an aid station."

A black-haired American sergeant who fought by the side of Colombians on Old Baldy said: "They are the bravest people I know. They never retreat without their wounded."

The sergeant was wounded and a Colombian saved him.

"This man carried me on his back through raging shell fire," the sergeant said.

He told of another Colombian in the fight:

"He was in a bunker when the Chinese suddenly surrounded it. When the first Chinese showed his face through the doorway, he plunged his knife through the Chin's throat, killing him."

Then the Colombian ran out of the bunker and found two more Chinese opposing him. Somehow or other he killed them both with the same knife in a hand-to-hand fight and got out of the scrap with only a badly cut knuckle."

Research To Be Carried On

TORRANCE, Calif. (AP) — A five-year research program to determine whether alumina can be extracted from local clays will get under way soon at the Salem, Ore., alumina plant bought Tuesday by the Harvey Machine Co. of Torrance.

The firm bought the plant from the General Services Administration.

A Harvey spokesman said hiring would begin at the plant as soon as new equipment is installed and present equipment overhauled.

Arch W. Metzger, general manager of the plant since it was built during World War II, is to continue at that post, Lawrence A. Harvey, executive vice president of the firm, reported.

The Harvey company also plans to build an aluminum reduction plant near The Dalles, Ore.

Unknown Plane Bombs Korea Lines
SEOUL (AP) — Unidentified aircraft dropped four bombs on U. S. Seventh Division troops in the blazing Old Baldy area, wounding three U. N. soldiers, the Army said Wednesday.

The division, engaged in the bitter fight for the Western front hill, said only the bombs fell near the front.

More information would have to come from higher headquarters, it added.

The term "United Nations soldiers" used by the division could apply to its Americans, Colombians, Ethiopians or South Koreans, but is often used to describe non-American troops.

No fatalities or equipment damage were reported.

The bombing is the third attack by unidentified aircraft recently in Korea. All three are under investigation.

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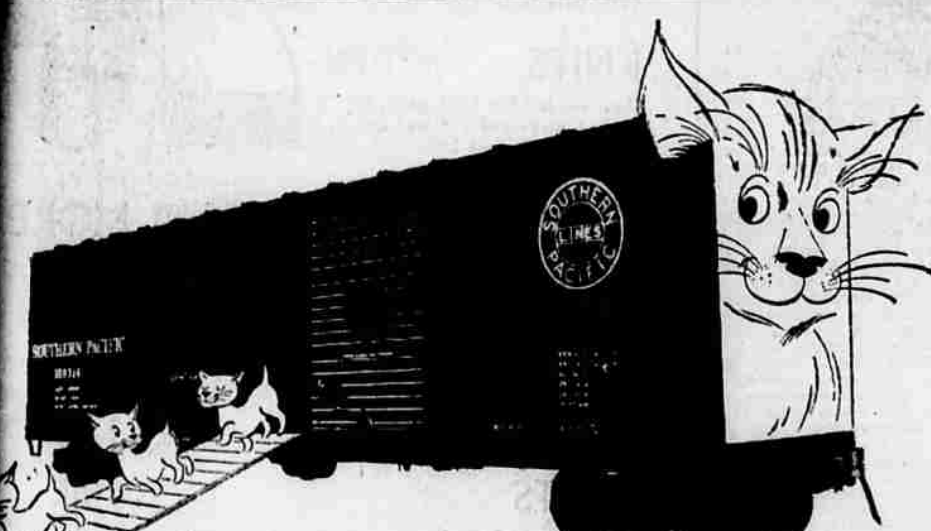
