TOKYO — Gen. Mark Clark, U. S. Far East commander, said Thursday night he does not think the loss of Old Baldy on Korea's Western Front is a serious blow, but "it is always serious when we lose people."

The general arrived Thursday night from a 10-day swing through Southern Asia.

He told reporters there is no indication the Chinese assault force shadows a spring offensive by the Communists.

Veterans Loan Bill Action Held

SALEM — The increased farm and home loans for veterans won't be available until 90 days after the Legislature goes home, the State Department of Veterans Affairs pointed out Wednesday.

The department said it won't accept bigger loans until the bill becomes law.

The bill to increase the limit on the \$5,000 loans to veterans of World War II and the Korean War has been signed by Gov. Patterson. The new limits will be \$9,000 for home loans, and \$15,000 for farm loans.

Since the bill didn't carry an emergency clause, it doesn't become law until 90 days after legislative adjournment.

Discrimination Question Answered

PORTLAND — A survey on racial discrimination, brought answers from three Oregon colleges Thursday that they are free of such discrimination.

David Robinson, chairman of the governor's advisory committee under the state Fair Employment Practices Act, said the three are Eastern Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College of Education and the state medical school.

Other schools have not answered yet.

The Portland local of the Longshoremen's union also answered it does not discriminate because of race or religion. The union had been asked because it was noted no Negro was a member of the local.
