At Portland Monday the potato supply was moderate. The demand was good and the market was slightly stronger. Brokers sales of Oregon russets, from the Deschutes district, U. S. No. 1 A, brought 4.85 a 100 pound sack.

At San Francisco the potato market was about steady. Sales of Klamath Russets, U. S. No. 1 A, 2 inch minimum size, brought 4.75 a 100 pound sack.

At Los Angeles the potato market was slightly weaker. The offerings of long white potatoes were very light. There were no early sales.

At Chicago today the supply of old potatoes was liberal. The demand was light and the market was about steady. Track sales of Idaho Russets, U. S. No. 1 A, 30 to 35 per cent 10 ounces and larger, ranged from 5.70 to 5.75 a 100 pound sack. Street sales of U. S. No. 1A and generally good quality Idaho Russets ranged from 5.50 to 6.00 a hundredweight. Most of the sales ranged from 5.75 to 5.85 a 100 pound sack.

At the Yakima shipping point March 27, there were too few sales of potatoes to establish a market or quota prices.

Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation over the weekend amounted to 1644 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 339 cars. Oregon moved 67 cars, Washington 13 cars and Idaho 279 cars.

Track holdings of potatoes at the 16 major cities of the nation totaled 1402 cars of old potatoes and 178 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 1514 cars of old potatoes and 142 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago. Lasts tiller embryo A E ago. Arrivals at the 16 major cities today amounted to 696 cars of old potatoes and 184 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 1092 cars of old potatoes and 125 cars of new potatoes arriving one week ago.

CHICAGO (U) — A steep cutback in supplies ran hogs up 10 to 50 cents a hundred pounds Thursday and cattle were steady to 25 cents better.

An estimated 5300 hogs was the smallest Thursday run since August. Most butcher weight hogs sold upward from \$20.50 to \$21.40. Sows took \$18.00 to \$20.00 generally.

Good and choice steers and yearlings sold from \$19.50 to \$23.00 and good to low-choice heifers from \$19.00 to \$22.00. Cows topped at \$16.00.

Sheep arrivals also were considerably under the number expected, and this moved lamb prices 50 cents higher in most cases. Choice wooled kinds ranged downward from \$24.50. The first springers of the season brought \$23.00.

Senate Approves Taft For Aide Job
WASHINGTON (U) — The Senate Thursday approved the nomination of William Howard Taft III to be ambassador to Ireland.

Taft is the son of Senate Republican Leader Taft of Ohio.

The Senate also confirmed the nomination of John M. Allison as ambassador to Japan and the nomination of John Roger Lewis, aviation executive of New York, as assistant secretary of the Air Force.

School Report Praised, Hit
SALEM (U) — The State Board of Higher Education's Anderson report, which would make sweeping changes in the courses taught at the state-operated university and colleges, drew both praise and criticism Wednesday night at a hearing before the Legislative Joint Ways and Means Committee.

The proposal would allow the University of Oregon and Oregon State College to train grade school teachers. They now train high school teachers. Portland State College would be permitted to train both kinds of teachers. It now has no teacher training.

The three state colleges of education, which now are limited to training grade school teachers, would be permitted to train high school teachers, and to offer bachelor degrees in the fields of social science, humanities and science-mathematics.

Supporters of the bills told the committee that the proposal would solve the teacher shortage, but opponents said it wouldn't and would cost too much.

Dr. J. E. Cramer, Portland, dean of the general extension division of the state system of higher education, said Oregon now is training only half the teachers it needs.

Defense Rests in Palmerton Case

stand throughout this morning's session, Desendorf through Weidner's testimony, spent most of his time attacking Palmerton's management prior to Weidner's taking over.

Except for challenging certain audit reports and other records offered by Maxwell for the Palmerton audit, Desendorf made surprisingly little attempt to discredit some of the plaintiff's principal charges.

The Weidner attorney seemed more interested in attempting to force Weidner to take over the Palmerton management as a result of Loren Palmerton's managerial mistakes.

In this connection, Atty. Desendorf had Weidner recount instances of two lumber sales made by Palmerton on which Weidner contended the firm lost money.

Prior to this, Desendorf had put forward to establish from a written memo signed by Palmerton and Weidner that Palmerton would not make such sales.

Weidner is president of the Weidner Lumber Company, a Chicago lumber sales firm. He has a heavy financial interest, amounting to approximately half ownership of the Palmerton firm. His Chicago company has a contract for exclusive sales of the Palmerton lumber and sawmill products output with the exception of direct sales made to local retailers and one or two other buyers in this general area.

Palmerton, in his suit, contended that Weidner was impairing the future of the Palmerton company for the immediate benefit of his Chicago sales company.

As his first defense witness yesterday, Weidner's attorney, Desendorf put Robert A. Simpson, Seattle, the accountant on the stand. Simpson, member of the Arthur Anderson accounting firm, testified that a Palmerton audit made by his firm about the time the Palmerton suit was introduced showed another audit offered by Palmerton was in conflict with the firm's true financial position. He also said he believed the firm was solvent at the time of the audit. Palmerton had charged the firm with being "in imminent danger" of becoming insolvent when he filed his suit Feb. 12.

Desendorf then called Cy Cramer, whom Weidner brought here from Chicago as the new Palmerton general superintendent. He had Cramer tell how his lumber experience began as a logging camp waterboy at the age of 14 and continued up through the ranks to his present position.

In closing the case this morning, Desendorf had Weidner review his relations with Palmerton. Weidner went back to the time he and Palmerton bought W. A. Spangler's interest in the Palmerton firm.

He said his relations at the time with Mr. and Mrs. Palmerton were congenial despite frequent arguments about company practices. He told how on the night of April 7, 1952, he was a guest in the Palmerton home. And then told

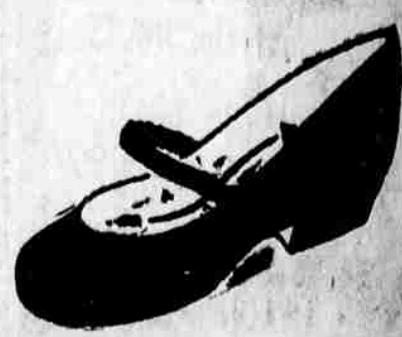
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
