## Gloria Graham Mystery To Many Of Hollywood Crowd

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The movie town can't figure out Gloria Graham, the provocative blonde who won an Academy Award last month.  
 The gal has been in pictures for almost 10 years, yet few people claim they really know her. Maybe that's why she's such a good actress.  
 But her unorthodox ways upset many people in Hollywood. These people expect Gloria to conform to the modes and methods of the movie town. She refuses. Three studios have let her go, and some of the partings have not been friendly.  
 Now she is taking the rap from certain columnists (who accuse her of having become afflicted with the Oscaritis. A seasonal disease caused by award poisoning and resulting in swelling of the head and the sense of proportion.) The carping is caused by Gloria's unconcern over cashing in on the publicity benefits of her Academy Award.

I'm an expert observer of the disease, and I don't think Gloria has it. She acts just the same as she did before she won the big prize — unpredictable, somewhat vague, but still fascinating.  
 She is continuing her string of unique portrayals in "The Big Heat." When I saw her on the set, she was about to commit a murder. Her face was made up to be horribly scared, a gangster having splashed her with scalding coffee.  
 Was she thrilled about winning the Oscar?  
 "Sure, who wouldn't be?"  
 Where is it now?  
 "My son Timmy has taken it over. He keeps it in his room and thinks it's a toy." Timmy, 4½, is her son by her former husband, director Nick Ray. Her first mate was actor Stanley Clements.  
 Gloria has had an amazing career during her span in Hollywood. A Los Angeles girl, she was first signed by MGM as Louis B. Mayer's own protegee. But the furthest she got was playing a sec-

ond lead in "Merton of the Movies," with Red Skelton.  
 "When my option came up, they offered to let me stay at my same salary, \$500," she recalled. "Dore Schary offered me \$750 at RKO, so I took it. Six months later, Schary left RKO."  
 Her experience at RKO started out happily. Schary handed her a brief but meaty part in "Cross-Seminar." It won her her first Academy nomination, and it's still her favorite role.  
 She became unhappy after Howard Hughes took over the studio. She once complained to me that she had been offered second leads to Ava Gardner and Laraine Day and leads in B pictures. This was after she was an Oscar nominee and co-star with Humphrey Bogart. The studio turned down a loanout
