

Legislators Act On Oil Limit Bill

SALEM (AP) — A state oil and gas drilling code, designed to conserve whatever petroleum products might lie beneath Oregon's soil, won 28 to 3 approval Monday in the Oregon Senate, and went to the House.

Sen. Philip S. Hitchcock, Klamath Falls, chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee that labored long over the bill, said steps must be taken now to provide for conservation if and when oil is struck.

Pointing out that millions of dollars already is being spent by oil drillers in Oregon, Hitchcock said the bill would restrict the number of wells, and assure drilling methods that would save the most oil and gas. The State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries would administer the proposed new law.

The Senate voted 18 to 11 for a House bill to put tolls back on the Vancouver-Portland Highway Bridge. The money would be used to finance a second bridge, to be completed in about four years at a cost of 18 million dollars, including approaches.

With the seven Portland senators voting against the bill on the ground it would work a hardship on college students and workers who use the bridge daily, the bill came within a single vote of being sent back to committee to provide for commuter tickets.

Supporters of the bill said the present bridge is carrying 32,000

vehicles a day, or 2,000 more than capacity. In five years, they said, it would be carrying 40,000 cars, and that in three years, there would be delays of an hour at some times during the day.

The new bridge would be designed and built by Oregon. The Washington Toll Bridge Authority would finance it and collect the tolls, as well as maintain it. The tolls would be taken off in about nine years.

Sen. John C. F. Merrifield, Portland, objected to building the new one alongside the present one, asserting it would be a good atomic bomb target.

Objection that Portland would lose much of its Southwest Washington trade was made by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Portland, who added that many people would quit crossing the river to escape Washington's sales tax.

Measures to abolish capital pun-

ishment and to provide a full-time parole board with powers to fix prison sentences were buried in committee.

Both houses, in an effort to complete the 86-day-old session by April 18, speeded up their machinery by suspending the rules and sending each other's bills to committee as soon as passed by the house that originated them. This means there won't be a day's interval from the time a House bill is passed and

the time it is put into a Senate committee. The same will be true of Senate bills sent to the House.

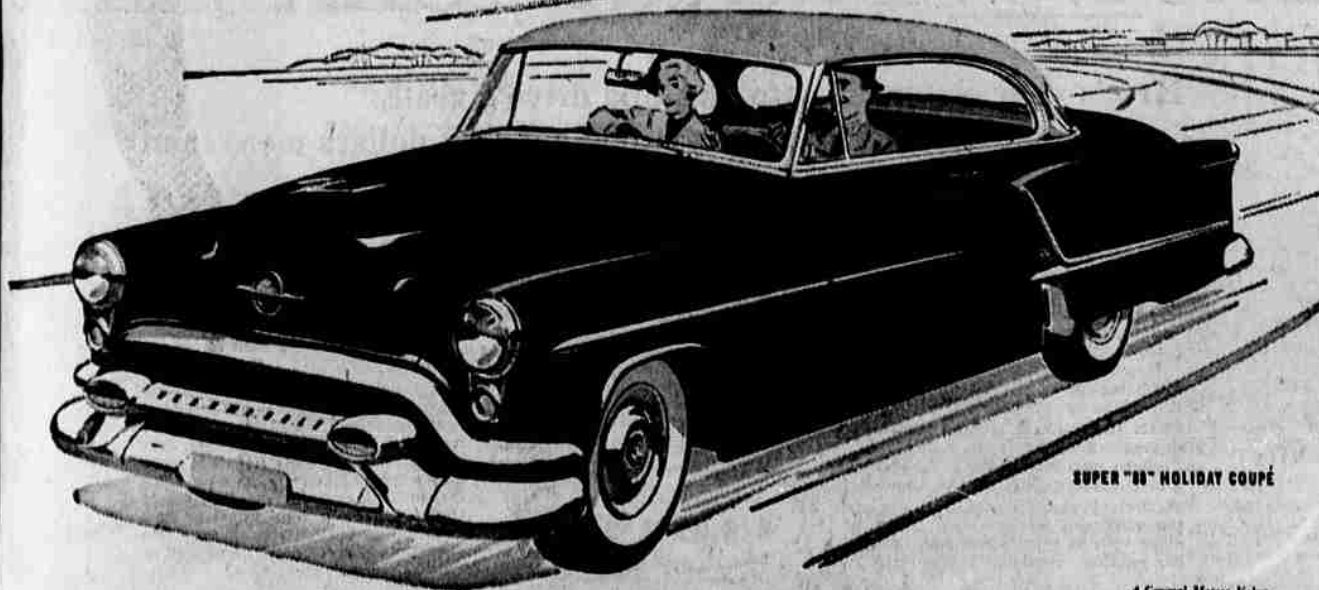
