Basin Men To Be Named To PMA Unit

Three Klamath Basin Potato men will be named to the Oregon-California Potato Marketing Agreement Control Committee Thursday evening, April 8.

Klamath and Tulelake growers and handlers are to meet at the Merrill Recreation Hall at 7:30 p.m.

A grower member and alternate will be nominated for Klamath County. For the Tulelake area nominations will include one grower member and one handler member and their alternates.

Appointments to the Control Committee are made by the Secretary of Agriculture from a list of nominees submitted by growers and handlers from areas concerned.

Duties of Control Committees consist primarily of recommendations to the Secretary of Agriculture. Any size or grade regulations governing potato marketings are issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. Such regulations are issued only upon recommendation of control committees.

Marketing regulations cannot be used when potato prices are above parity. Regulation of marketings is legal only for surplus crop years when there is an over supply of potatoes. In such years the excess supplies can only be dumped or diverted to uses other than table stock. Prices are invariably low.

Marketing agreement regulations are designed to reduce excessive supplies by diverting the low quality portion of the crop.

Most potato men agree that if potatoes must be dumped consumers should get the best of the crop. Experience has demonstrated that the nation can use about 350 million bushels annually. Supplies over 350 million bushels must go into stock feed, starch or other uses.

Intention to plant reports indicate that a 350 million bushel crop is possible for 1953. Most growers expect that marketing regulations will be applied to the crop.

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Volunteer Workers Draw Praise For Cancer Drive

"Without our volunteers, we couldn't begin this campaign," declared Keith O'Hair, American Cancer Society campaign chairman, at the 1953 cancer crusade opened here.

The chairman, a volunteer himself, said, "When I talk about volunteers, I am referring to doctors, nurses, teachers, bankers, druggists, shopkeepers, housewives, high school girls and boys, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts—almost anyone you can think of—because they all have a stake in this great fight."

"The Klamath County Unit is aiming to raise \$5,000 this year," Mr. O'Hair said. "This means person-to-person contact. It is only through talking with a person that

the complex problem of cancer can be presented with the most force. "And when we talk with people during April, which is Cancer Control Month by act of Congress, we are not merely asking for money as important as that is. We are telling them of our educational program, of how they can watch for the danger signals, of how they can save their own lives, perhaps, and those of their loved ones by alertness and prompt action."

I am happy to report that in the course of our campaign in years gone by, our doctors reported more people coming to them for check-ups, more people showing up with early cancers that were in the curable stage, than at any time in the year," he said. "With our enlarged and enthusiastic group of volunteer workers, we should make a better record than ever this year."

The money raised in Klamath County will be used for the year-around program of education, service and research. This means preparation of educational material for distribution through every possible media, the provision of dressings and other sickroom comforts to cancer patients being treated at home, the contribution to the \$4,100,000 research program which

Freak Accident Fatal For Man

WALLA WALLA (A) — A loaded revolver that fell from a car glove compartment and hit a potted plant caused the death in a freak accident Monday of Lawrence L. Jacky, 51, assistant deputy to the director of physical rehabilitation at the veterans hospital here.

Coroner Leonard DeWitt said Jacky was putting the plant in his car when the glove compartment door fell open, the gun he always carried spilled out, glanced off the pot and discharged. The bullet hit Jacky in the head.

Jacky had been a member of the hospital staff since 1946. He formerly taught in high schools at Colville, Spokane and Mount Vernon. His widow, a son and a daughter, all of Walla Walla, survive.
