Paul Deller's Pelicans, riding on the impetus of a smashing tri-meet in over Roseburg and Eugene, will need even more depth in the cinder test that's on tap Saturday at Medford.

It's the Rogue Relays which this year will see six teams in the field. Grater and Marshfield have been added to the Big Four—Klamath Falls, Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland.

The meet is more popularly dubbed the "Little Hayward Relays" because it's modeled after the annual Hayward Relays, scheduled for April 18 at Eugene.

**CHORE**  
Finding enough distance runners and weightmen to go around in this 12-event fest is proving quite a chore for Deller.

But the spike coach, finishing his last season as boss of Klamath's track fortunes, is expected to come up with plenty of answers tomorrow.

The meet is comprised of nine relay events and three single events—the pole vault, discus and javelin.

**FIELD EVENTS**  
Field events in the relay category—adding the best three marks for each team—are the broad jump, shot put and high jump.

Running races are the 440, 880, mile and two-mile relays, the distance medley and shuttle hurdles. Scoring will be on a 10-7-4-2-1

basis for relay events, 5-4-3-2-1 for individual events.

Spike Beeber, ex-champ back in Klamath Falls after in the armed service, is expected to wage a strong battle for

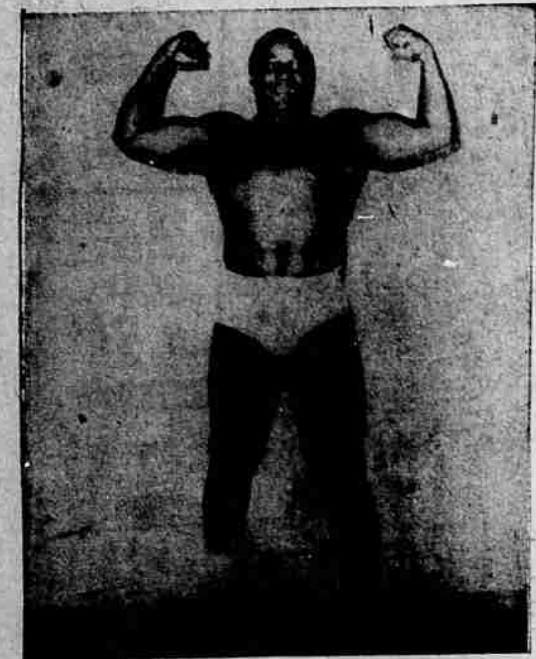
