

**WALL STREET**  
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market advanced substantially Wednesday in its second straight recovery session.

The market has been under severe selling pressure for more than a week as a result of Communist peace moves around the world.

Prices were up around 2 points at the best with losses going to the neighborhood of a point. The better gains were more generous than in several weeks.

The rise, however, didn't bring out vigorous trading. Volume was down to an estimated two million shares as compared with two and a half million shares traded Tuesday and more than three million shares on Monday when the market was falling fast.

**CHICAGO LIVESTOCK**  
CHICAGO (AP) — Hog prices advanced to the highest level in more than three weeks Wednesday on a strong to 35 cents higher market.

Cattle, with 11,000 salable, were broadly irregular from 50 cents higher to as much lower. Sheep trading was not established up to late in the trading day.

Butcher weights of the 7,500 salable hogs generally sold from \$21.00 to \$21.65 but with little better highest since March 15. Sows took \$18.00 to \$20.00 mostly.

Helpers showed the advance in cattle while heavier weights of steers and cows and bulls were on the weaker side. Most good to prime steers and yearlings sold from \$19.50 to \$20.75. Good to prime heifers brought \$19.50 to \$24.00. Cows topped at \$16.00. Bids on 2,500 wooled sheep offerings were as much as \$1.00 to \$1.50 lower than the same time Tuesday but first hands were talking steady values of \$23.50 downward.

CHICAGO (AP) — Early strength in grains gradually evaporated as trading progressed on the board of trade Wednesday, only to show some resurgence at the close. Soybeans were higher throughout the day and closed around their best levels.

Early May deliveries of corn and oats were firmer and out of line with other contracts, influenced to some extent by local supply factors.

Additional moisture in the winter and spring wheat belt helped ease that cereal and lack of much export business was a further softening influence.

Wheat closed 1/2-1 1/2 cent higher, May \$1.59 1/2-1 1/2, oats 1/4-1/2 cent higher, May \$2.24 1/2-1 1/2, corn was 1/2-1 1/2 cent higher, May 72 1/2-1 1/2, and rye was unchanged to 1/2 cent higher, May \$1.65 1/2-1 1/2. Soybeans were 1/4 to two cents higher, May \$3.01-43.02, and lard was three cents higher to two cents a hundred pounds lower, May \$10.30.

**POLICE ACTION**  
NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Speeding up their war on anti-white Mau Mau terrorists, British-led forces Wednesday announced they have killed 21 of the tribesmen in the past 24 hours. The government said also that the last contingent of 1,500 troop reinforcements from Britain arrived in Nairobi by air.

At Portland Monday the potato supply was fairly liberal. The demand was slow and the market was unsettled. Brokers sales of Oregon Russets were absent. Asking prices for U. S. No. 1 A's, ranged from 4.65 to 4.75.

At San Francisco the potato market was about steady. Track sales of Russets from the Deschutes district, U. S. No. 1, 6 ounce minimum size, brought 5.00 a 100 pound sack in a few sales.

At Los Angeles the new crop of potatoes was weaker. The old crop potatoes were slightly weaker on the small sizes and steady on the large sizes. Trucklot and carlot sales of old crop Idaho Russets, U. S. No. 1 A, ranged from 4.25 to 4.75 a 100 pound sack.

At Chicago the potato supply was liberal. The demand was light for Russets and the market was dull and prices were slightly weaker. Other stocks were about steady. Track sales of Idaho Russets, U. S. No. 1 A, washed, 30 to 35 per cent 10 ounces and larger, ranged from 5.20 to 5.35 a 100 pound sack. Idaho bakers, U. S. No. 1, 10 ounce minimum size, brought \$8.80 a 100 pound sack. Street sales of U. S. No. 1 and generally good quality Idaho Russets, brought mostly \$3.75 a 100 pound sack.

At the Yakima shipping point Friday, the potato market was very slow and dull. There were too few sales to quote prices.

At the Idaho Falls shipping point Friday, potato offerings were light. There was light wire inquiry and the market was very slow and dull. There were too few sales to quote prices.

Total shipments of potatoes throughout the nation over the weekend amounted to 1296 cars. Of this number the Pacific Northwest shipped 225 cars. Oregon moved 28 cars, Washington 10 cars and Idaho 187 cars.

Track holdings at the 16 major cities of the nation totaled 1095 cars of old potatoes and 260 cars of new potatoes. This compares with 1402 cars of old potatoes and 172 cars of new potatoes on track one week ago.

Oboler's method of images is through the use of Polaroid glasses. Each theater patron will receive a pair of the glasses with his admission ticket. These glasses have the property of so controlling light that the two reflected images from the screen are rejected or accepted, depending on which eye they are intended for.
