Noted Traveler Lashes US Foreign Policy In Speech Before Knife, Fork Club

Three hundred Klamath Falls residents got a big surprise Tuesday night when Garveth Wells, noted explorer and after dinner speaker, suddenly delivered a lecture on the United States foreign policy.

Speaking before the Knife & Fork Club in the Willard Hotel, Wells first gave his listeners a graphic word picture of a trip to Kashmir by way of Sweden, Norway and the Taj Mahal. Then he

lashed out at both the Eisenhower and Truman foreign policies and called for an immediate ban on shipment of machine tools abroad.

"Look what happened when Japan got a supply of our machine tools and then learned to produce their own," Wells declared. "Machine tools made it possible for Japan to produce armament which almost defeated us in World War II. People need to wake up to the fact," he continued, "that we are not independent of other countries because we have an adequate supply of iron ore for arms production. What we don't have is the other strategic metals such as tungsten and manganese. We must get these from Asia, Africa and South America."

In his attack on United States foreign policy, the explorer declared that America is being hoodwinked by current Russia peace moves.

"This is just a delaying action on Russia's part," he added, "so they can catch up with us on production of atomic weapons. Some day there will be a showdown which will decide whether Russia or the United States is going to dominate the world."

It is Wells' opinion that the United States should make every effort to win the friendship and support of the Arab people.

"Like us they believe in God and are deeply religious," he pointed out. "Their Allah is the same as our God. The people in the Kremlin are godless."

Wells also warned that it is Russia's ultimate plan to industrialize China. "The Orient is much more important to us than Europe," he said. "If Russia gets control of countries such as Indochina, Siam and Korea, our supply of strategic materials will be cut off."

He said in following his present foreign policy, the United States is "compromising with evil."

"When our generals want to win battles, they get fired," he declared. "I warn you that if we conclude a peace in Korea under present conditions, it may be the beginning of the end for the United States of America."

Wells also sharply criticized the role England is playing in the present world crisis.

"We can't forget that Russia got her first jet planes from England," he declared. "Right now England is permitting Ceylon to sell rubber to Russia. After all, England is a nation of shopkeepers—they'll trade with anybody." Wells was presented to the club members by Nick Long who served as toastmaster.
