Altamont 8th Grader Wins Garden Club Essay Award

The essays and posters entered in the Garden Club Essay and Poster Contest have been judged by the local and district judging committees. All essays but one were entered by pupils of the Altamont Junior High School; the one exception was by a pupil from the Bonanza eighth grade. The local judging committee for the preliminary judging of the Altamont essays consisted of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Schuh, Mrs. Frances Davis and William Francisco of Peterson School.

The posters were all entered by the Klamath City Schools and were judged by a committee consisting of Mrs. Lawrence French, Mrs. Kenneth McLeod Jr., Mrs. Gilbert Walters and Russell Pengelley of the Fremont Junior High School. The final judging was done by a committee consisting of the County School Superintendent, Carroll Howe; the Agricultural Agent, Mr. J. D. Vertrees and the District Garden Club Conservation Chairman, Mrs. Verona Dahler. The winning essay, "A New Lease On Prosperity" is printed herewith:

It was a bountiful, green valley peopled with prosperous farming folk. These farmers, as their ancestors before them, had always lived in the valley; and this present generation still used the basic farming principles passed down to them, with only slightly modernized equipment.

As an average example, take farmer Anderson, a respected man in the community, admired because of his perseverance in managing his farm in the more hilly region rimming the valley. Anderson was often heard to remark to his neighbors on, "what tough work it was plowing up and down his slopes." His neighbors also admired the large, although slowly diminishing profit gained from the sale of the single crop raised on his land.

Yes, Anderson was a well-to-do man and one action that contributed to lining his pocket was the selling of the pine stand that grew on the largest hill on his property. "That county agent" called it a "cover crop." This stand was sold, much against the earnest advice of the county agent. He claimed the stand was a protection against erosion.

The agent also objected to non-diversified farming, insisted they should use some newfangled idea called "crop rotation." He had ideas on plowing, too; said "contour plowing" was another safeguard against erosion, although everyone knew that the man who plowed the straight furrow was generally a fine farmer. No one

Veterans Given Preference In Purchase Of Farm Land

World War II veterans are given priority in the purchase of 108 full-time farm units currently offered by the federal government in the Columbia Basin Irrigation project in Washington. Vere McCarty, service officer for the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs, reported today.

Applications must be filed with the office of the Bureau of Reclamation, Ephrata, Wash., on or before May 14, to receive priority. Veterans must have served honorably for 90 days or more between Sept. 18, 1940, and July 3, 1952.

This is the third and the largest farm offering by the Reclamation this year. The 108 farms are situated in 15 to 20 miles north of Pasco and about 130 miles southwest of Spokane, in Franklin County.

They range in size from 38.4 to 107.3 irrigable acres. Most of them are priced between \$2500 and \$5000. All but six of the units have been dry-land farmed and have higher appraised values than the units in native grass and sagebrush. The farms are scheduled to receive their first irrigation water in 1954, from canals having their source in Grand Coulee dam, 110 miles to the north.

Former Priest Speaks Here

Dr. J. A. Fernandez, former Roman Catholic priest, began a three-day speaking engagement at the Bible Baptist Church, 224 Ward, last evening. He will speak again tonight and tomorrow night, 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Fernandez, born and educated in Spain, came to the United States in 1921 and attended the Rosaryville Dominican Theological Seminary where he was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1924. He took special work at Notre Dame University and for 15 years served as assistant pastor of St. Anthony of Padua Church, New Orleans. He held the position of superior of the Dominican Fathers

and father confessor of several convents of nuns.

Dr. Fernandez left the priesthood in 1942. In 1945 he joined the Presbyterian Church and was ordained for the ministry. He has received the degree of master of theology from Princeton Theological Seminary and the degree of doctor of sacred theology from Temple University. For three years he held successfully the pastorate of the Robert Graham Memorial Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia. He is now engaged in a lecture tour throughout the nation presenting his reasons for embracing Protestantism. The subject for his address last night was the story of his conversion, "I Was Blind, Now I See," an illustrated message on "Catholicism and Protestantism Compared" tonight. Tomorrow night, Dr. and Mrs. Fernandez will dramatize a message, "The Tragedy of Mixed Marriage."

Fire Permit Season Opens

MOUNT SHASTA — Robert E. Jones, supervisor of the Shasta National Forest, advises that on April 15, in accordance with state fire laws, burning permits will be required before anyone can legally burn slash, brush, trash, or any type of debris.

Jones also says that the law requires an inspection of the area by forest officers prior to the time of burning and that once a permit is obtained, the burning operation must be handled in accordance with the stipulations on the permit.

Jones says forest officers stand ready to answer any request for burning permits and will make the inspections of the area and material to be burned prior to the issuance of the permit, free of charge. The inspections are made and permits issued to safeguard the person doing the burning, so that the necessary burning operation can be completed safely. Any permit issued will state the hours of burning, safeguards required, and the number of persons required to keep the burning operation under control at all times. Any permit issued does not release the person doing the burning from liability should the fire escape his control. State law states that should any fire escape or threaten to escape from a person's control, fire fighting agencies are authorized to take action to control the fire. The cost of suppressing said fire can be collected from the person who is charged with the responsibility of keeping the fire under control. The law also states anyone who suffers damage to his property, resulting from the escape of a fire on another person's land, can sue for and collect damages.

To be on the safe side, should you desire to start a burning operation, contact the nearest forest office and request a permit. Burn in accordance with the permit stipulations and in small piles only. Keep any fire, regardless of size, under control at all times.

State Camp Charge Same

PORTLAND (AP) — Camping charges at state parks will be continued this summer, the Oregon State Highway Commission decided Wednesday, with a slight increase on the Silver Creek Falls and Honeyman Parks fee schedules.

The commission heard C. H. Armstrong, parks superintendent, recommend partial development of a state park at Rooster Rock in the Columbia Gorge. He said it would cost about \$50,000.

But Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said the facilities for handling traffic might add anywhere from \$500,000 to \$750,000 to the cost. Commissioner Milo K. McIver said he doubted the state would ever have enough money for such a project.
