Hobby Show Photos Slated

Interest in the photography division of the annual Klamath Basin Hobby Show, April 16-17-18 has brought numerous inquiries as to how the photography division is to be sub-divided, according to Bernard Griffin, hobby show chairman, who has released the following information.

Color transparencies and motor pictures will be judged in separate divisions. Other rules are (1) a set of three photographs on any subject; (2) a set of six photographs on any subject, developed and printed by the exhibitor; (3) one to three color projection prints on a 35 mm. slide; (4) flash pictures or outdoor night scenes; (5) photoflood or artificially lighted photos; (6) one or more color prints, developed and printed by the exhibitor; (7) a set of three tinted photographs tinted by the exhibitor; (8) a set of three or less silhouettes; (9) snapshot albums, any subject or type.

Entries may also be made of collections of butterflies, pressed wildflowers, taxidermy, minerals, fossils, stamps, coins, war relics, Indian relics, buttons, match covers, post cards, motels, autographs, dolls, place cards and favors, airplane pictures, ships, railroads.

In handicrafts, art, practical arts, ship models, aeronautics, industrial craft, household arts, manual training, archery, Micro railroads, gardening.

Entries must all be in by noon, April 16.
