The Dalles Dam Go-Ahead Given

PORTLAND (AP) — Army Engineers got clearance Thursday to go ahead with the next unit of the Dalles Dam, a section expected to cost more than 40 million dollars.

The work includes an assembly bay for the powerhouse and substructure for the first 14 main units.

Engineers called for bids, to be opened here May 19. A previous call for bids, to have been opened April 1, was cancelled when the Department of Defense decided to review all major projects under construction. This review ended with authorization for the bidding.

Two major contracts had been let previously for the dam, which is expected to reach a total cost of 350 million dollars. It is expected to be producing 1,716,000 kilowatts of power by 1960.

Red Cross To Aid POW Work

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The American National Red Cross has offered its full resources of personnel and supplies to assist in repatriation of sick and wounded prisoners of war in Korea when the exchange of prisoners, proposed yesterday by the Communists, is effected.

James T. Nicholson, Red Cross executive vice president, cabled H. L. Janeway, American Red Cross Far East director in Tokyo, to assist Gen. Mark W. Clark in any manner whatsoever consistent with the traditional role of the Red Cross.

The Red Cross has maintained large supplies of prisoner-of-war food parcels, clothing, medicines and other comfort articles in Korea for immediate distribution to released prisoners. The first of these supplies were shipped to the Far East as early as 1950.

Exactly a year ago today, on March 28, 1952, the Red Cross completed training of a special team of workers to assist in repatriation of prisoners of war. Some American Red Cross members of this team are now stationed in Japan and Korea. Others in the United States are prepared to leave for Korea immediately.

City Schools Score Again
